MINUTES

1. Call to order

Present: Council members Bell, Pounds, and Ward

Staff Present: Administrator Fragoso, Asst. Administrator Hanna, Chief Cornett, Chief Hathaway

2. Election of Chair and Vice Chair

Council Member Pounds nominated Council Member Bell for Chair of the Public Safety Committee. There being no other nominations, the vote for Council Member Bell as Chair of the Public Safety Committee was unanimous.

Council Member Bell nominated Council Member Pounds for Vice Chair of the Public Safety Committee. There being no other nominations, the vote for Council Member Pounds as Vice Chair of the Public Safety Committee was unanimous.

3. Approval of previous meeting's minutes – November 9, 2020

Council Pounds made a motion to approve, and Council Member Bell seconded the motion. The minutes passed unanimously.

4. Citizens' Comments -- none

5. Old Business

A. Update of pedestrian crosswalks and intersection safety

Administrator Fragoso reported, "The City has been working with Stantec and the Wild Dunes Resort with SCDOT's approval of installation of new crosswalks along this stretch [Palm Boulevard between 41st and 57th avenues]. Along this stretch there are five that have been permitted by SCDOT. We submitted the encroachment permit. They have been reviewed. They have been approved by the agency, and all those construction and design documents have been finalized. We are working with the Wild Dunes Resort on the construction of these. They have gracefully, and we are so grateful for their offer to cover the cost of the construction of these crosswalks." The goal is to have installation of the new crosswalks complete by the end of March, which is the expected opening of the hotel.

Chief Cornett will email a video to Committee members of the rapid rectangular flashing beacons. He reported that SCDOT receives complaints about their brightness at night when installed in residential areas. Installation costs approximately \$10-\$15,000 per crosswalk. He suggested it may be worth considering having a pair installed at the crosswalk near the shopping center.

B. Update on Front Beach Loading zones and parking

Chief Cornett said he has reached out to the company who said they could paint the newly designated loading zones for \$3,000. He said the signs will say, "Loading Zone Only, 8am-2pm," which will require no change to the City ordinance. Those loading zone spots will become regular parking spaces after 2pm. Five signs will be needed.

6. New Business

A. Consideration of purchase of two (2) Dodge Durango SWD V6 Pursuit SUVs for the Police Department in the amount of \$30,450 each [FY21 Budget, Capital Projects Fund, Police Capital Outlay - \$41,000 and State ATAX Fund, Police Capital Outlay - \$41,000]

Administrator Fragoso said these cars are budgeted expenses. Chief Cornett said his goal is to move away from sedan-style vehicles and move to SUVs. He said this Dodge Durango will work better in the beach environment. Even with all the upfitting and markings needed, the vehicle purchases will still come in under budget.

MOTION: Council Member Bell made a motion to approve the request as per Chief Cornett's description and recommend it to the Ways & Means Committee. Council Member Pounds seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

7. Highlights of Departmental Reports

A. Fire Department – Battalion Chief/Training Officer Hathaway

Chief Hathaway reported there were 87 calls for service in December, which was a 43% increase over December 2019. However, year-to-date calls for service are down 14% from 2019. He reviewed the notable events and activities for December including the old ladder truck being traded in and Chief Graham's retirement.

B. Police Department – Chief Cornett

Chief Cornett shared the City received a grant of approximately \$70,000 that will go towards the costs of a beach patrol vehicle, a trailer to pull the beach patrol vehicles, and a mobile digital billboard sign "along with \$20,000 of overtime money for patrolling the beach during the COVID response."

He also reported that staff has begun receiving the COVID vaccine. One of the patrol vehicles is out of service and will cost too much to fix. This particular vehicle was not slated to be replaced until next year, so discussion on its replacement will happen in the near future. A boat that ran aground within Wild Dunes is being removed.

Chief Cornett stated there were 830 calls for service in December. The total number of calls for service in 2020 was 16,869, which is a 50% reduction from 2019. There were 62 incident reports taken in December, closing out the year with 1,043, which is about average. Significant incident increases could be found in DUI arrests and marijuana and narcotic-related charges. He also shared an analytical map of the island indicating locations of incidents.

8. Miscellaneous Business

The next meeting of the Public Safety Committee will be on Thursday, February 4, 2021 at 3pm.

9. Adjournment

Council Member Pounds made a motion to adjourn, and Council Member Bell seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 3:28pm.



LOWVELO 2021 - Event Summary

LOWVELO is seeking permission from the Isle of Palms community to host the LOWVELO ride from IOP on Ocean Blvd. LOWVELO would like to secure two blocks of Ocean Blvd, on the north side of the Blvd., from 14th to J C Long Blvd.

LOWVELO is a fundraising bike ride for Hollings Cancer Center, Medical University of South Carolina; scheduled for November 6th, 2021. The event will have several cycling distances for different ability levels; 10 mi (family friendly), 17, 50 and 100 mi rides.

The 17, 50 and 100 mi rides will start at Patriots Point in Mt Pleasant, proceed onto Sullivan's Island, pass through IOP, continue up into the Francis Marion National Forest and back to IOP through Mt Pleasant.

The 10 mi ride will start and finish in IOP from Ocean Blvd. rides will start and finish on Ocean Blvd. The venue will include a food and beverage, amplified sound (live music / announcer) and hospitality area. In addition, the venue will have event tents, tables, chairs, finish truss, event fencing, porto potties, trash receptacles, spin bikes and a small stage. [*We have included a venue site map for review.*](#)

Expected number of riders by distance: 750 total riders

10 mi = 250

17 mi = 250

50 and 100 mi combined = 250

Safety & Security:

LOWVELO will use a combination of private security, and police from local jurisdictions including , Mt. Pleasant, IOP, Sullivan's Island, County Sheriff and SC Hwy Patrol. Private security or local Police will be hired to secure in and around the venue 24hrs a day during our build, event, and tear down. We will hire police for all road closures and to assist at busy locations even when the ride is on open roads under "rules of the road".

Trash & Recycling:

LOWVELO will rent 2 dumpsters (30yd) one for trash and one for recycling, unless host community has other resources; to be placed at the start/finish venue. These will be delivered the day before the build starts and will be the last items removed. Trash and Recycling containers will be placed around the venue and managed by our "green team" volunteers.

Catering/Food/Beverage:

A local catering vendor will be hired to provide meals at the finish hospitality. All participants will receive free food and drink in our hospitality area as part of their registration.

**Crisis Management:**

During event hours we will staff a command center on site and ask that all agencies we are coordinating with to provide a point of contact (police, fire, etc.). This command center will be used to monitor the riders progress on the route (first rider to last), trouble shoot any issues that arise (missing directional signage, traffic light out), dispatch emergency resources, and monitor weather or other potential threats to the event.

Additional attention and plan will be implemented for COVID-19 protocols, based on local, county, state, Dept of Health and CDC guidelines.

Sec. 3-2-8. - Garbage roll-out carts and county recycling containers shall not be kept upon street or road rights-of-way.

Garbage roll-out carts and county recycling containers shall not be placed in the right-of-way of a street or road except when placed for collection. Garbage carts and recycling containers shall not be placed for collection prior to 5:00 p.m. on the day before collection. Garbage carts and recycling containers shall be removed from the right-of-way no later than 9:00 a.m. on the day following collection. Except for such times when lawfully placed for collection, no garbage carts or recycling containers shall be allowed to remain clearly visible from a street, road, or right-of-way. Garbage carts and recycling containers located on publicly owned areas, including, but not limited to, public parking lots, public parks, public beach and recreational areas, or any City-owned property, are exempt from the requirements of this section. The City has the right to move garbage carts and recycling containers placed in violation of this section.

Editor's note— Ord. No. 2013-03, § 1, adopted May 28, 2013, changed the title of § 3-2-8 from garbage roll-out carts shall not be kept upon street or road rights-of-way to garbage roll-out carts and county recycling containers shall not be kept upon street or road rights-of-way.

Sec. 3-2-9. - Collection.

All garbage generated from residential property will be collected in accordance with schedules established by the City from time to time.

(Code 1994, § 3-2-9; Ord. No. 1997-16, § 7, 8-26-1997)

Sec. 3-2-10. - Placing garbage roll-out carts for collection.

When placing garbage roll-out carts for collection, they shall be placed within ten (10) feet of the edge of the pavement of the street. Carts which are not placed in a location which is easily accessible by collection personnel and equipment will not be emptied. The handles of the carts shall be faced toward the street.

(Code 1994, § 3-2-10; Ord. No. 1997-16, § 8, 8-26-1997)

Sec. 3-2-11. - Collection of major household appliances.

The collection of major household appliances such as refrigerators, washing machines, dryers, dishwashers, furniture, bed mattresses, etc., will be made upon notice to the Public Works Department. The Public Works Department will then notify the owner when to place the appliance on the edge of the road for collection by the department.

(Code 1970, § 18-13; Code 1994, § 3-2-11)

Sec. 3-2-12. - Penalties for noncompliance with or violation of this chapter.

Any person violating any provision of this chapter shall, upon conviction, be punished as provided in section 1-3-66. A violation of this chapter shall not be considered as a continuing offense, but each day that this chapter is violated shall be a separate and distinct offense.

Sec. 3-2-13. - Definition of curb.

For purpose of this chapter, the term "curb" shall include the edge of a street, road or right-of-way.

(Code 1994, § 3-2-13; Ord. No. 2001-3, § 2, 2-27-2001)

ARTICLE B. - DOGS⁴

State Law reference— Powers of municipalities in regard to dogs and rabies control, S.C. Code 1976, § 47-3-70.

Sec. 6-2-11. - Permit recommended; term.

It is recommended that any person, resident or visitor, to own, keep, harbor or allow a dog within the City limits, exercise, walk, or allow a dog on public properties apply for a free permit from the City. Each permit shall be valid for one (1) calendar year commencing January 1 of each year, and no longer.

Sec. 6-2-12. - Certificate of vaccination required and presented prior to permit and tag issuance.

No person shall own, keep or harbor any pet within the City, or be issued a permit, unless the pet has been vaccinated against rabies as provided herein.

- (A) Unless the pet has received (as evidenced by certificate) a vaccination from a licensed graduate veterinarian using a vaccine which is good for a period of one (1) year, provided the vaccine has been approved with the longer period of time specified by the State Department of Health and Environmental Control after consultation with the executive committee of the Association of Veterinarians.
- (B) A State Department of Health and Environmental Control certificate of pet rabies vaccination will be issued by a licensed graduate veterinarian for each pet, stating the name and address of the owner, the name, breed, color and markings, age, sex of animal and the veterinary or pharmaceutical control number of the vaccination.
- (C) Coincident with the issuance of the certificate, the licensed graduate veterinarian shall also furnish a serially numbered metal tag bearing the same number and year as is on the certificate. The metal license tag shall bear the name of the veterinarian and shall at all times be attached to a collar or harness worn by the pet for which the certificate and tag have been issued. Tags must be of the same color and shape when issued in offices of veterinarians.
- (D) The owner shall have a valid certificate of rabies vaccination readily available at all times for inspection by the animal control officer, law enforcement officer or the SCDHEC designee.
- (E) In the event that a rabies tag is lost, the owner shall obtain a duplicate tag within seven (7) working days.
- (F) A certificate of rabies vaccination issued by a licensed veterinarian from another state will be accepted as valid evidence provided it is less than a year from date of issue.

(G) Rabies inoculation must be given by age four (4) months to all cats and dogs.

Sec. 6-2-13. - Removal of tag from dog prohibited.

No person shall wrongfully remove a tag from a dog registered as required by this article.

(Ord. No. 2019-14, § 3, 7-23-2019)

Sec. 6-2-14. - Running at large prohibited; exceptions.

- (a) No person owning, having an interest in, harboring or having charge, care, control, custody or possession of any dog shall cause or permit the dog to be off the premises of its owner or custodian, unless such dog is securely confined by a strong leash, securely and continuously held by a competent person owning, having an interest in, harboring, or having charge, care, control, custody or possession of the dog, or unless the dog is confined within a vehicle, within an enclosure surrounded by an adequate fence or within a house. Provided, however, that a dog owner or other person charged with the custody and control of a dog may allow the dog to roam at large on the beach between the hours of 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 a.m. from September 15 through March 31, and between the hours of 5:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. from April 1 through September 14. Such owner or custodian shall at all times be in close proximity to the dog, have a leash in hand, and have the dog under control. Nothing contained herein shall affect a dog owner or custodian's duty to comply with all state laws regarding vicious or dangerous dogs, or the duty to comply with section 62-26 requiring the removal of animal excrement.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to cause, permit, accompany or be responsible for the presence of any diseased dog on the streets or public places of the City or allow the dog to run on the premises of another, at any time; unless and in addition to the other requirements of this chapter the dog shall be securely muzzled to effectively prevent it from biting any person or other animal.

Sec. 6-2-15. - Violation, impoundment, penalties.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to fail to comply with the requirements of this article or to suffer or permit a dog to be a danger to the health, safety, or welfare of the public in violation of this article.
- (b) Any dog running at large in violation of this article shall be impounded. The owner of a licensed dog shall be given notice that the dog may be claimed from the City kennel within three (3) days. A dog with no license or identification will be held in the City kennel for two (2) days. An owner claiming a dog must comply with all requirements of this article and pay to the City an impoundment fee as established by City Council. Dogs not claimed within the applicable holding periods will be transferred to the County SPCA for disposal.
- (c) Violation of this article is a misdemeanor punishable pursuant to section 1-3-66.

Sec. 6-2-16. - Dogs not to disturb protected species and habitats.

In addition to the requirements of section 6-2-14(a), no person shall allow a dog to disturb protected species and habitats, as follows:

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow a dog to disturb nesting sea turtles, turtle nests or turtle hatchlings.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow a dog to enter into critical habitat areas which have been posted to prohibit such entry by the City or the State Wildlife and Marine Resources Department.
