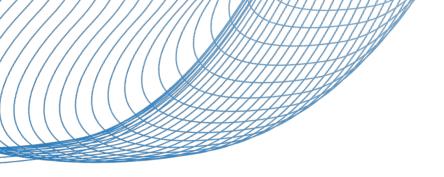

Management's Discussion and Analysis

- Summarizes City's performance for fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024
- Highlights:
 - Assets exceeded liabilities by \$71.4M (net position), of which, \$63.1M and \$8.3M were related to the City's governmental and business-type activities (Marina), respectively.
 - Revenues exceeded expenses by approximately 11.0M
 - Ending governmental funds balances were \$48.6M, an increase of \$5.7M over prior year.
 - \$4.0M of the total fund balance is available for spending at the City's discretion.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

- Capital asset additions during the year were \$4.4M and \$881,000 (governmental and business-type, respectively) including:
 - Storm water and tidal drainage projects
 - Vehicles and equipment
 - Dog park and various other projects
- Total debt decreased by approximately \$1.3M
- City's bond rating:
 - Moody's = Aa1 (high quality and are subject to low credit risk)

MINUTES

1. Call to Order

Present: Council members Bogosian, Hahn, Carroll, Streetman, Anderson, Ward,

Miars, Pierce, Mayor Pounds

Staff Present: Administrator Kerr, City Attorney Satzger, various department heads

2. Citizen's Comments

Sue Cotton, 2 Sand Dollar, asked City Council for action on first responder pay and attrition rates. She said safety needs to be of utmost importance to the community.

Susan Smith spoke with concern about the trash from the construction at Ocean Club Villas ending up in the ocean. She shared several examples of the debris. She thanked the City for its earlier efforts to hold the responsible parties accountable. She would like the City to engage the Environmental Advisory Committee to see what can be done to prevent it from happening in the future.

Dan Slotchiver read from a letter earlier submitted to City Council. It is attached to these minutes.

3. Presentations

A. Update on SC lobbying efforts - Tompkins, Thompson & Brown

Boyd Brown reviewed the previous efforts and successes of his firm on behalf of the City. He believes the new legislative year will focus on political and social issues. He mentioned that Representative Bustos is building a coalition of coastal communities to strongly advocate for funding of beach-related projects. He thanked Mayor Pounds for his efforts to secure beach nourishment funding from SCPRT.

Mr. Brown believes now may be a better time to approach SCDOT about changes to the IOP Connector. He also suggested the City apply for grants from the emergency services budget so that the City could shift resources to beach projects. He also suggested applying for transportation and infrastructure-related grants as the State is more inclined to fund those sorts of projects over beach renourishment.

When asked about the effort to reduce the ATAX money allocated for DMOs, Mr. Brown pointed out that the CVB and other DMOs are very politically active in Columbia. He suggested that the City work with the CVB to address this concern.

B. Beach Project Status Update – Steven Traynum, CSE

Mr. Traynum reviewed the work that has been completed in the past two weeks since Council's approval of additional sandbags and shoal management on October 14.

Council Member Pierce asked when the USACE will begin pumping sand again on the south end of the island. Mr. Traynum said work was stopped due to safety concerns, and he has no real word from them. Administrator Kerr added, "I would just say that particular project, the spoils, kind of getting the sand out of the spoils site has been, as you all know, problematic from day one and challenging from day one. To Stephen's point, I don't know that they're going to get additional sand out of that project from this contractor. They have authorized a different project with harvesting sand out of the Intercoastal Waterway. That is a contractor they know, have good experience with and that project is under contract to begin in January."

Council Member Pierce expressed concern that the amount of sand USACE was to place on the beach keeps changing. Mr. Traynum said he is not optimistic that the promised sand will ever be delivered, adding that the operation has been struggling for a while. Administrator Kerr said the last update from them indicated they would be pumping sand again, but no one has been on site.

When asked about pushing sand down towards the inlet, Mr. Traynum said the contractor that will be coming in January or February will be placing "250,000 yards in that same area and we can utilize that sand to move to the south."

Administrator Kerr then explained, "I would also add that we are having conversations with the Army Corps about an underperforming contractor. They have indicated that they have a bond for that work if Ahtna is unable to complete the work, it would be their intention to sever ties, use that bond to engage a third contractor to get that work done. Because they still need, at the end of the day, they still need the capacity out of those spoil sites. So I think the work would happen, it just wouldn't happen in the time frame that we've been expecting it to happen."

Mr. Traynum noted that the next king tides will peak on November 6; three to four days on either side of that date could be problematic. When asked what else the City or the citizens can do in preparation for the king tides, Mr. Traynum said, "By the end of this week, we'll place all the bags that the city has already allocated. Trying to predict what will happen over the next 30 days until the next Council meeting. Having the ability to place additional bags should the conditions warrant it would be a useful tool. You have the option at the east end. We still have the shoal management project. We're moving some of that currently. We can expand that to either end of the island. That comes with risk. If we were to move 60,000 to 80,000 cubic yards of sand to the Beachwood area, I feel pretty confident that that sand will sustain that beach to finish out the shoal attachment because we're really close and it's contracting every day. at least the original area that we're dealing with, but it's not a guarantee for sure. Similarly, at the east end of the island, that area has not been as erosional. It's been somewhat more stable over the past month. They are still losing sand, especially as you get past Ocean Club and out onto the golf course. That area is losing more and more sand, so we could max out that permit moving about another 120,000 yards or so to the tune of probably around \$800,000 or so. Again, that's all sand that nature is moving onshore for us. So it's kind of a decision to keep maintaining with sandbags like we're doing at an incremental rate. We can increase the protection level for individual owners, and several of them have taken the opportunity to do this, add additional bags at their own expense working under the City's permit to bolster their protection above what the City's

established as our threshold. Anything that you do with sandbags will continue to require maintenance. They've just shown that when they're exposed to waves like the ones at Beachwood, they're just not capable of withstanding these kind of storm waves that are directly impacting it. At the south end of the beach or even at the north end, you have a wider beach slope that's dissipating some of the wave energy. So by the time it gets to the bags, it's not near as energetic to move the bags around as it is right at Beachwood. So right now that's kind of our biggest concern, is just the ongoing erosion forces at Beachwood."

When asked how homeowners can put in sandbags, Administrator Kerr said, "If it is a property that already has sandbags, there's an existing order in place for those, and those owners have just done that. Taking note, we've documented the number of additional bags, and there's a requirement to remove those. We have had some property owners that are in an area that the City has not authorized bags. Those owners are reaching out directly to the State to try to get an emergency order on their own. So it depends a little bit property to property what their status is."

4. Approval of previous meetings' minutes

MOTION: Council Member Anderson made a motion to approve the minutes of the September 23, 2025 City Council Meeting and the October 14, 2025 Special City Council Meeting and City Council Workshop, and Council Member Bogosian seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

- 6. New Business
 - A. Consideration of beach debris removal contract with Trident Waste & Recycling for up to \$156,000 for CY 2026 and \$81,900 FY26

MOTION: Council Member Pierce made a motion to approve, and Council Member Hahn seconded the motion.

Administrator Kerr reminded City Council that this new model of beach trash collection includes removing the yellow barrels from the beach and having trash picked up roadside, similar to what is done on Kiawah Island. While there was only one bid on this contract, Trident was the low bidder on the recent dumpster contract, and the City is confident in their ability to fulfill this contract as well. He pointed out the increased cost of the contract is for an additional amount of trash pickup days, resulting in \$34,000 over the budgeted amount.

Administrator Kerr introduced the new Deputy City Administrator, Sean Kuester.

VOTE: A vote was taken with all in favor.

B. Consideration of ATAX Grant to the Lutheran Retreat Center, \$10,000

MOTION: Council Member Streetman made a motion to approve, and Council Member Anderson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

C. Consideration of proposal from CSE for final design, bidding, and construction administration for the major renourishment project for \$669,508

MOTION: Council Member Hahn made a motion to approve, and Council Member Streetman seconded the motion.

Administrator Kerr explained, "This was work that was contemplated in next fiscal year, so it would be an unbudgeted expense in this year, and it is specifically for, this is a project that has applications for environmental permits are in and underway. This proposal would allow for the final design of the project, for the bid package to go out and handle the bidding, as well as the construction administration for this project."

When asked why this project was not being put out to bid, Administrator Kerr responded that historically, the City has not stopped with an engineering firm once the permits have been applied for and then engaged another firm to handle construction administration and bidding. He added, "Our procurement code contemplates that we would not do that. It's exempt from competitive pricing. So I think it's a combination of just prior practice and the code. Nothing in there says that we couldn't, we could not do that if that was the will of Council."

Council Member Bogosian said that the City's procurement code makes it possible for the project to be put out to bid, adding that this is the biggest project the City has ever undertaken.

Council members Streetman and Anderson noted the urgency to have sand on the beach, and putting any part of the project out to bid would only slow down the process. Council Member Miars said she did not want the project to be delayed but believes that the engineering parts of the project could be put out for bid to see if the City could realize any savings.

Mr. Traynum said, "There are several different tasks that are included in this, and they all somewhat tie in together. I will note that there's about \$70,000 was a contingency line items that we included to account for contingency, and I understand the City sometimes does that on their own. So that is something I just wanted to note. As far as your question goes, Ms. Miars, is I don't know. I kind of have to talke to our in our office and with our group. The next stepp is really putting together a final design and then putting those into a bid specification package that is really an engineering firsm, not property, but that is our project that we are designing, and then to turn it over at that p9oint, for another group to come and implement that project is not something that I'm sure works very well because they may not agree with everything that we did. We may not agree with everything they are going to do. But it is our, it is our stamp on the documents that are going out. So, I'm not sure that there is an easy logical breakpoint. That is kind of why we phase it. Phase 1 is this breakpoint where we did the permitting that is out there. You will have a City permit that they own that can be utilized by anybody. But I don't think there is a logical breakpoint in that next step. And I do think there would be a pretty significant delay in implementing something if we're trying to get a bid package out early next year."

Council Member Pierce said he did not believe it was uncommon for such proposals to be separated into two task orders. He suggested putting out an RFF with a three-week response, noting that next items in the project timelines don't start until February.

MOTION: Council Member Pierce made a motion to amend the approval of the proposal to Items 1 and 2 and to follow procurement code and put the remaining items out for bid in a shortened timeframe. Council Member Bogosian seconded the motion.

Mr. Traynum reviewed the timeline of the proposal. Council Member Hahn asked, "If we want to have sand on the beach, for next year's storm season this fall. Tasks one through six have to start now, correct?"

Mr. Traynum answered, "In my opinion, it does. You could try to push it off. It's just the later you push it off, the more you're pushing that bid process off, and dredgers may find additional work, may not have the ability to. We've already let them know that this project's going to be out there with an estimated scope and timeline. But if something comes up and they're still waiting on this to come out, they may take advantage of that."

Mr. Traynum shared that he has spoken to some of the dredging firms about the project, and they are excited to bid on it.

Council Member Anderson suggested keeping the proposal as is, and then going out for bid on work related to hard structures on the beach. Mr. Traynum explained that adding hard structures to the beach does not have to be years down the road. Administrator Kerr reminded Council of funds in FY26 for groin design and in FY27 for the building of groins.

MOTION: Council Member Pierce made a motion to amend his amendment to approve the proposal to Items 1-6 and to follow procurement code and put the remaining items out for bid in a shortened timeframe. Council Member Bogosian seconded the motion.

Mr. Traynum said, "I'd just like to add that we did do this process back in 2016, and we're going through the last project. We went through the RFQ process and selected on that, so it's not unprecedented. And I have no problem with it at all. I understand completely. I get that. I do want to have the opportunity to speak with our carrier, though, just to make sure that if we, what our risk is as a company, if we put out drawings that are signed and a bid package that we put together, do we carry any risk if another firm implements that project? I just want to have the opportunity to have that discussion with them to understand where we fall on that, because that would be a pretty significant thing for us. Now, I'll just say for that construction admin part of that, I will say that we've built more projects than anybody else in the state by far, excluding the Corps of Engineers. I'm going over a 40-year history. I'm not putting our rates up against anybody and our track record up against anybody. I'm not really, I get the process, but as much as I can try to alleviate your concerns on that, that part is a hand-holding thing that takes a relationship with the dredgers and the community and, is a critical part of the project so I get both sides of it."

Mayor Pounds asked Mr. Traynum to speak to his conversations with the dredging companies to which Mr. Traynum stated numerous factors that contribute to saving money on a dredging contract. Mr. Traynum also detailed some of the day-to-day work his firm does during a beach nourishment project.

Discussion ensued about the last time CSE was in the bid process.

Mayor Pounds stated that CSE has done the last two renourishment projects. A separate conversation about hard structures on the beach as well as who could perform that work is needed. He believes any savings the City could see on this upcoming renourishment project will be because of established relationships and not in construction administration.

VOTE: A vote was taken on the amended motion as follows:

Ayes: Miars, Pierce, Bogosian

Nays: Carroll, Ward, Hahn, Streetman, Anderson, Pounds

The motion failed 3-6.

Council Member Pierce would like to see the City put contracts out for bid regularly to see where savings might be found. He would like to see the City stop the process of sole sourcing.

VOTE: A vote was taken on the original motion with all in favor.

MOTION: Council Member Ward made a motion to approve, and Council Member Anderson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

MOTION: Council Member Ward made a motion to approve and waive the reading. Council Member Hahn seconded the motion.

Administrator Kerr provided an update on the resolution, "as kind of a way of a major update on all of this. We've been having conversations with the PRT staff about kind of our best path forward, and I think they are going to release the funds when the grant gets released. We will then have to send back anything that doesn't get spent. It's generally how I think they will operate. But I would say that they have asked us to, because as the Mayor mentioned earlier, we have this current fiscal year of funds, which is \$1.5 million. They are trying to get the State budget to include additional funds next year. So they have asked if we could update the application. We have been in contact with them about what we are going to apply for and they have suggested that we put in there the total ask that we could make of the State. So that would be, this is a matching grant, so it is half of the City's fund and then it is also controlled but it cannot go on any parts of the private beach. So when you kind of do that ciphering and you take out the Wild Dunes portions that they cannot pay for you then look at the portions that are private it gets to a grant request of them of \$5.3 million. So in the resolution right now it says \$1.5 million. I would ask that the motion include an amendment to change that to \$5.3 million. That would allow them to consider it once. If all they can get is \$1.5 million, that's all we'll get. But if they can give us \$1.5 million out of this year's budget and then give us the additional amount to get up to the full 5.3, that would allow them to just release it once it's available to

them. But as I understand it, the money, the first \$1.5 million would be February. If money makes it into next year's budget, for some reason it would be October and not February. I'm not sure why."

Since the full amount is not guaranteed, Council Member Bogosian asked if the City could "tie in all the work that we've already done then ask to be reimbursed for all the sandbags and everything else?"

Administrator Kerr said SCPRT does not work like FEMA and any money received must be spent by the deadline or it is nullified.

Council Member Ward made a friendly amendment to approve the resolution with the amount of the request amended to \$5.3 million. Council Member Pierce seconded the motion.

VOTE: A vote was taken on the motion as amended with all in favor.

MOTION: Council Member Ward made a motion to approve and waive the reading. Council Member Anderson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

It has come to our attention the agenda for Tuesday's city council meeting dated October 28, includes the "consideration of proposal from CSE for final design, bidding and construction administration for the major renourishment project for \$669,508 (unbudgeted in FY26, but shown as FY27 expense of \$575,000- Beach Preservation Fund) [p52-62].

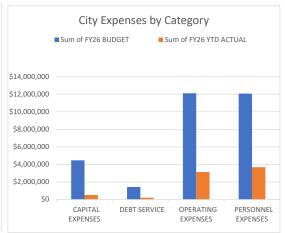
Being both Island residents and having served as Founding Members of the Isle of Palms Beach Ad Hoc Committee, we have strong concerns that we feel compelled to address.

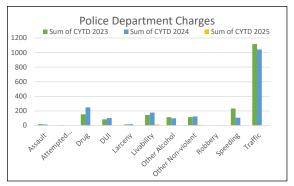
As you will recall, the committee had concerns about relying solely on CSE, without getting a second opinion. Since the recommendations were presented to Council, at the beginning of 2025, there have been two separate alternative presentations to the city, one privately funded by Island residents and another funded by the city. Both have presented concerns with the current plans and offered alternatives. Of particular significance is that both alternative companies also perform beach renourishment, monitoring and protection, but also have full time engineers on staff, something we understand our current contractor does not. While we appreciate CSE's longstanding role with the city, we believe it in the city and residents' best interest to at least consider one of the alternative companies. Our understanding is that on Tuesday the plan is to only consider CSE, essentially disregarding the hard work and countless hours put into studying the very issue we want to address. This is additionally concerning as there was commentary in one alternative opinion criticizing CSE's outlook of the beach as overly optimistic and voiced, for the first time publicly, that the conditions of the beach are severe and likely to get worse with time. They recommended solutions quite different from anything CSE has offered to date. Further, as best we know, the second opinion provided and paid for by the Council has not yet been formally presented to the Council for discussion. While we agree that it is time to move urgently and quickly, we see no basis for a "no bid' contract from CSE alone. Why not offer it to all three of the companies who expressed interest? A formal bid solicitation with a 30 day turnaround process for this major undertaking by IOP and a review of their recommendations seems more appropriate, coupled with each provider advising when they will be ready to start the re-nourishment.

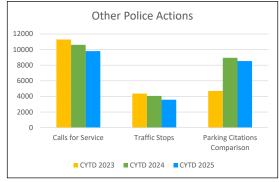
In the event a vote is called on Tuesday, we would strongly encourage the CSE proposal be tabled until alternatives are presented. This is a large expenditure and in addition to economics, we want to have the best chance for a long and successful program. With all due respect, moving forward at this point with CSE without due diligence and without looking at other firms and their bids represents a failure of duty of care and breach of the public trust, all for which we understood was the basis for the creation and study by the ad hoc committee.

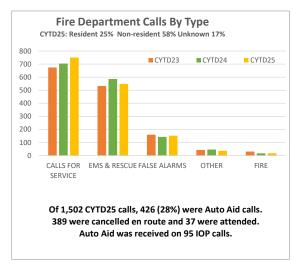
City of Isle of Palms Operations Dashboard

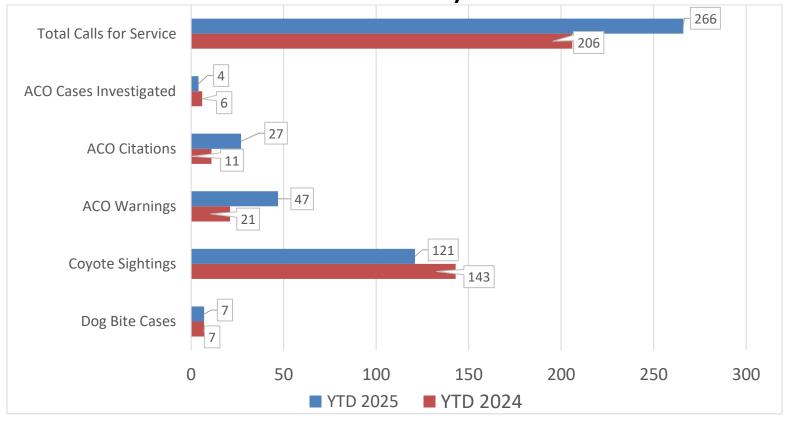




Drug, Gun, and DUI Charge Trend – Year to Date



Animal Control Activity - Year to Date





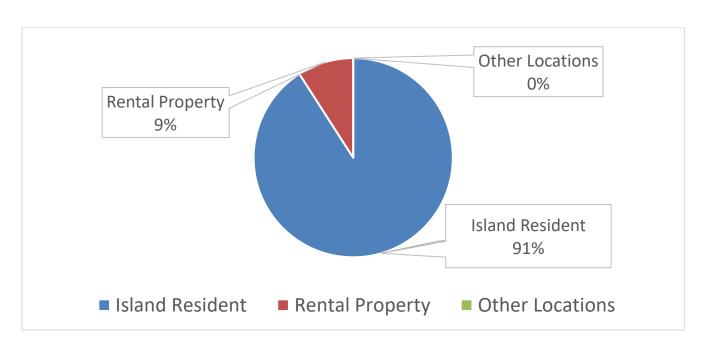

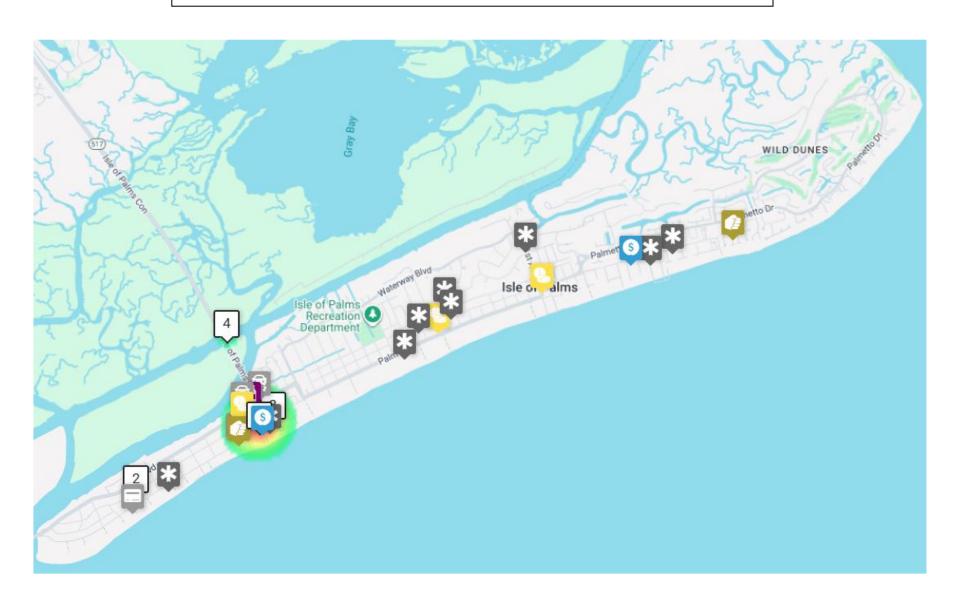

Livability Complaint by Property Type – OCTOBER 2025



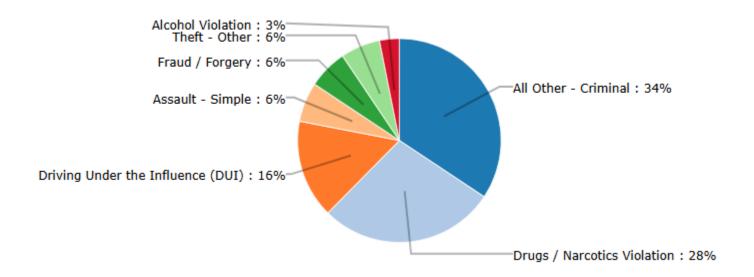
INCIDENT REPORT DENSITY/HEAT MAP OCTOBER 2025



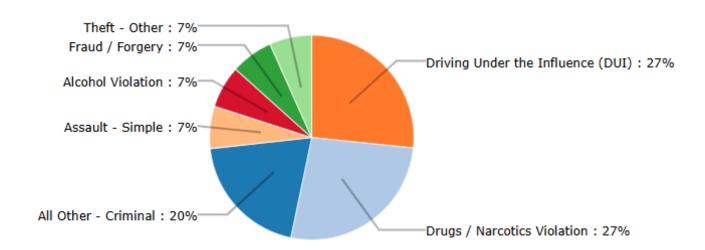




Reported Incident Crime Class Types – OCTOBER 2025



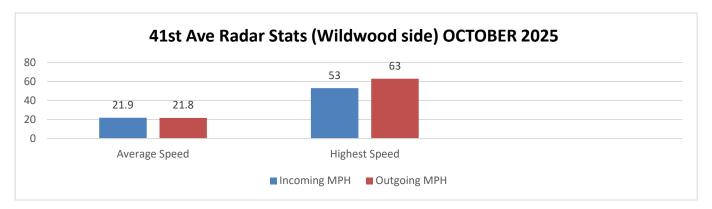
Reported Incident Crime Class Types (Red Area) – OCTOBER 2025

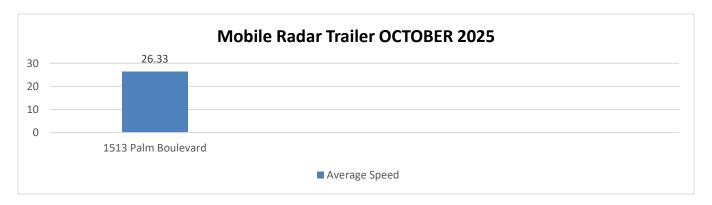

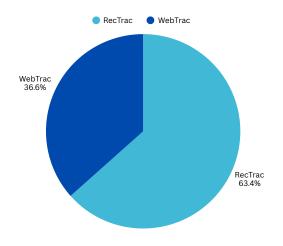

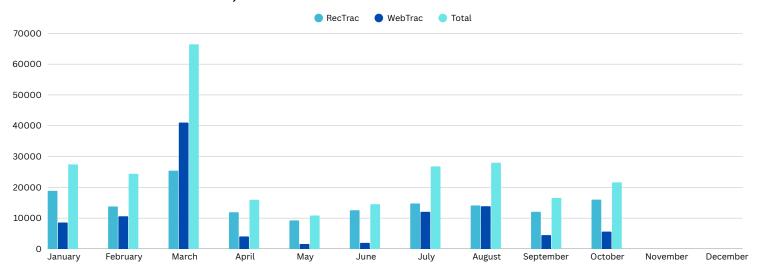


Monthly Revenues 2025

Revenue sales brought in by programs, athletics and events.

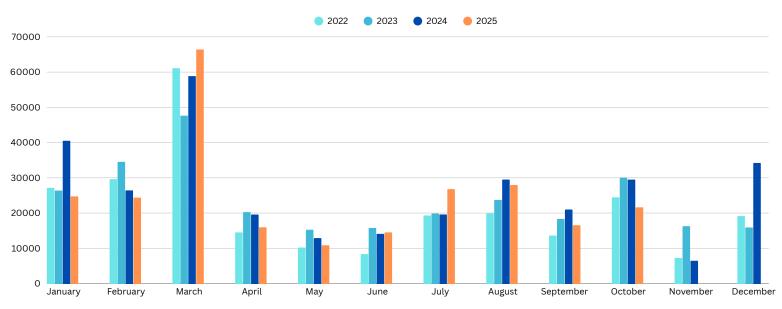

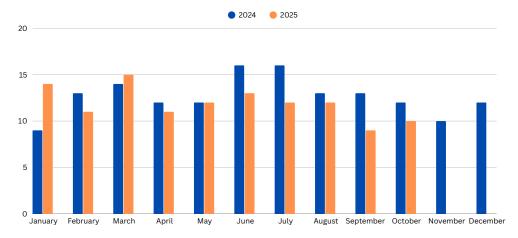

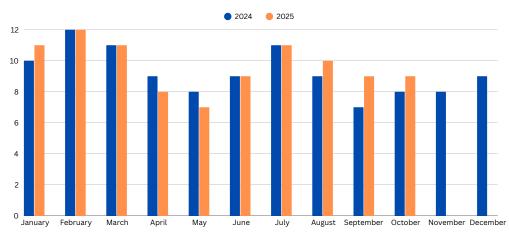

October 2025 Notes:

- General Fund revenues year to date represent approximately 12% of the annual budget, with stronger performance in Local Option Sales Tax and Parking revenues compared to the prior year reflecting continued visitor activity, while Business License and Building Permit revenues are trending lower due to the timing of annual renewals and slower development activity, and Property Tax receipts have been recorded and remain flat with last year, aligning with current assessment levels and expected seasonal collection patterns.
- Business License revenue totals \$307,000 year-to-date compared to \$394,000 during the same period last year, reflecting a decrease of approximately \$87,000 (–22%) driven primarily by the timing of annual renewals and fewer new licenses issued. Building Permit revenue totals \$329,000 year-to-date compared to \$364,000 last year, also reflecting a decrease of approximately \$35,000 (–10%) tied to slower development activity, with both revenue streams expected to improve as additional renewals, applications, and new project submissions occur later in the fiscal year.
- General Fund expenditures are currently tracking at 29% of the annual budget, which remains below the year-to-date benchmark of 33% for the second quarter.
- The City currently holds approximately \$54.5 million in cash and investments across the Local Government Investment Pool and Truist bank accounts. Total cash balances have increased by \$8.6 million from the \$45.9 million held at this time last year. The General Fund cash balance is at 25% of annual expenditures, aligning with the City's established financial policy target.
- The LGIP investment accounts are currently earning an average interest rate of 4.3195%, a modest decrease from the 4.3958% rate reported in the prior month. Despite this slight decline, the LGIP continues to outperform the majority of comparable investment alternatives.
- There is \$1.5 million in unspent SCPRT funding for Marina dredging, earmarked for this year. Additionally, \$27.5 million is restricted for tourism-related expenditures or beach preservation, including \$2.250 million from state funding allocated for stormwater collection system and drainage improvements earmarked for 38th and 41st Avenues and Waterway Blvd later this year. As well as, \$1 million awarded in April 2025, from the State SCPRT budget is allocated for beach renourishment.

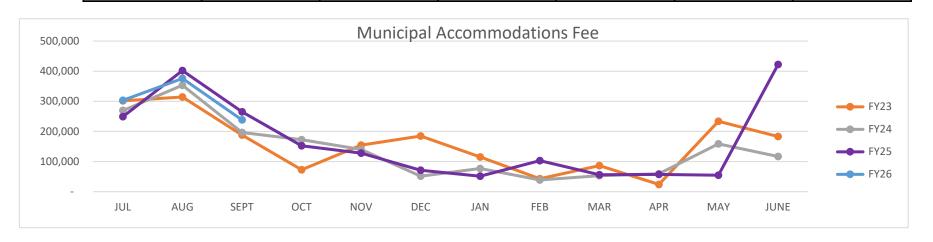


Note: Beach Nourishment Impact on Fund

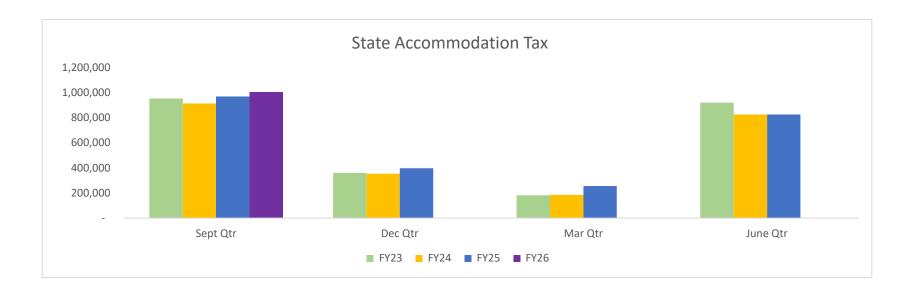
The projected negative fund balance is primarily attributable to the planned large scale beach nourishment project scheduled for Fiscal Year 2027. This initiative represents a substantial investment in the City's long-term coastal resilience and infrastructure.

While the financial forecast reflects the estimated cost of the project, it is important to note that the City is pursuing grant funding to offset some of the expenditures and the Beach Preservation Committee will be exploring other avenues.

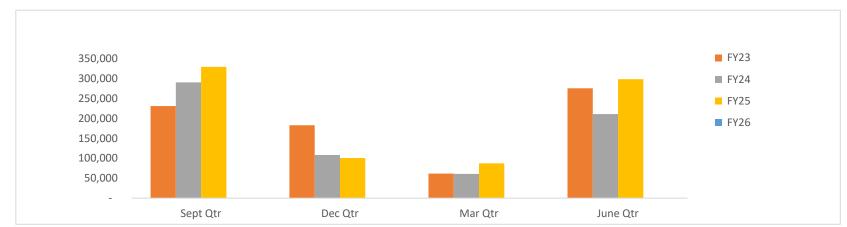

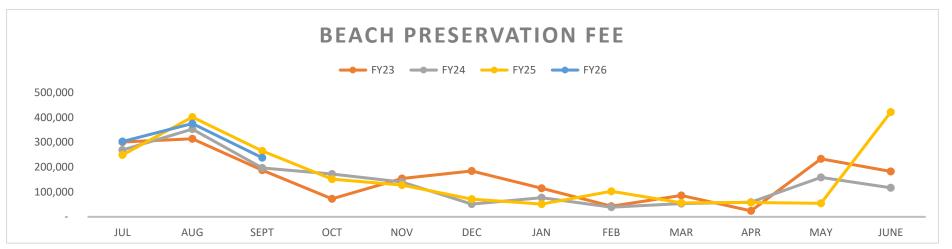




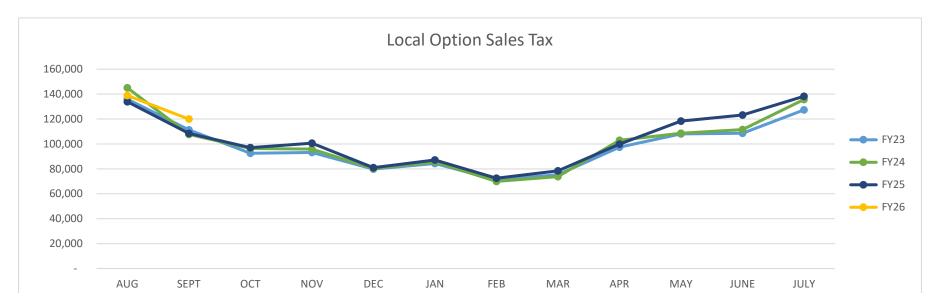

City of Isle of Palms Request for Qualifications (RFQ 2025-02) for Beach Management- Alternatives Analysis

BACKGROUND

The city is requesting qualifications from firms that specialize in managing beaches that suffer from erosion to provide City Council with guidance on specific beach erosion and management practices, plans and policies. This analysis will inform council's long range planning as it considers ways to preserve the planned 2026 major renourishment project.

The city has engaged with multiple professional firms already and those firms have identified a number of options that could be considered to help slow down erosion on the two ends of the island. Based on prior experience of dealing with eroded conditions and the future cost of beach renourishment, the city would like to have a comprehensive analysis performed on specific beach management practices and methods including, but not limited to:

- Stepping away from active beach management on all or part of the Island's beaches
- Beach renourishment only
- Beach renourishment plus adding shore perpendicular groins at key locations
- Beach renourishment plus adding breakwaters at key locations
- Beach renourishment plus adding geo-tubes at key locations
- Beach renourishment plus creative shoal manipulation to minimize damage of future approaching shoals
- Any combination of the above methods and any others deemed worthy of consideration

Each of the items listed above has considerations including but not limited to physically changing the look and feel of the beach, initial cost, ongoing maintenance cost, likelihood of being granted state and federal permits, likelihood of being successfully implemented, impacts to wildlife and habitat, impacts to tourism, legal ramifications and negative downdrift impacts.

The city would like to engage a firm to analyze and provide guidance on each of the identified methods, and others deemed viable but not listed. This request for qualifications is the first step in the process of engaging a firm to provide such a report.

The chosen firm will be expected to:

She stated that he will primarily be recommending hotels, AirBnbs, restaurants, tours, guides, sightseeing and transportation. She will be setting up her YouTube channel, Instagram and website in the next month. She has indicated that there will be no exterior evidence of a business and no employees working at the house."

The applicant, Shannon Bednarova, explained that she is turning her love of travel into a social media and podcasting business.

MOTION: Ms. Gower made a motion to approve, and Mr. Miller seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

5. Miscellaneous

Mr. Thornburg said that a golf cart rental business the Board approved earlier in the year has a golf cart with removable signage parked in a front yard on Palm Boulevard.

Administrator Kerr explained a loophole that may make that permissible, "If you base a business out of your house, our code says you can't have any indication of that business. However, if you work in the town of Mount Pleasant and you have a Joe's tree cutter truck that you work for out of Mount Pleasant, and you bring that truck home, in that situation, there's nothing that says you can't have a sign on your truck. So it could be, so depending on which is correct, if they have based their business out of the home and the board approved it, then they would be prohibited from having a sign. If he has found an alternate solution and he's basing his business across the bridge, there actually would not be anything that would keep him from having a sign on his vehicle. So it's a little bit of a kind of wrinkle. But we can, we can look back and see what, what happened."

He also said he will circulate the order for the variance approved at last month's meeting prior to sending it to the applicant.

6. **Adjournment**

Mr. Miller made a motion to adjourn, and Ms. Gower seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at approximately 4:14pm.

ORDINANCE 2025-12

AMENDING THE BUSINESS LICENSE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ISLE OF PALMS TO UPDATE THE CLASS SCHEDULE AS REQUIRED BY ACT 176 OF 2020.

WHEREAS, the CITY of ISLE OF PALMS (the "<u>Municipality</u>") is authorized by S.C. Code Section 5-7-30 and Title 6, Chapter 1, Article 3 to impose a business license tax on gross income;

WHEREAS, by Act No. 176 of 2020, known as the South Carolina Business License Tax Standardization Act and codified at S.C. Code Sections 6-1-400 to -420 (the "<u>Standardization Act</u>"), the South Carolina General Assembly imposed additional requirements and conditions on the administration of business license taxes;

WHEREAS, the Standardization Act requires that by December thirty-first of every odd year, each municipality levying a business license tax must adopt, by ordinance, the latest Standardized Business License Class Schedule as recommended by the Municipal Association of South Carolina (the "Association") and adopted by the Director of the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office;

WHEREAS, following the enactment of the Standardization Act, the Municipality enacted Ordinance No. 2025-12 on [INSERT DATE], in order to comply with the requirements of the Standardization Act (the "<u>Current Business License Ordinance</u>");

WHEREAS, the CITY Council of the Municipality (the "Council") now wishes to amend the Current Business License Ordinance to adopt the latest Standardized Business License Class Schedule, as required by the Standardization Act;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the CITY of ISLE OF PALMS, as follows:

SECTION 1. Amendments to Appendix B. Appendix B to the Current Business License Ordinance, the "Business License Class Schedule," is hereby amended and restated as set forth on the attached Exhibit A.

SECTION 2. Repealer, Effective Date. All ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall be effective with respect to the business license year beginning on May 1, 2026.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the closure of Ocean Blvd between 10th Ave and Pavilion Dr between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, December 6, 2025 and the closure of Municipal Lot A between 6:00 p.m. on December 5, 2024 through 10:00 p.m. on Saturday, December 6, 2024; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that possession and consumption of alcoholic liquors or alcoholic Beverages other than beer and/or wine beverages within the event area is prohibited; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that outdoor possession and consumption of beer and wine beverages only, all outdoor musical performances and use of sound-amplifying devices shall end by 7:00 p.m. due to the proximity of the event to residential properties; and,
