MINUTES

1. Call to Order

Present: Council members Streetman, Anderson, Bogosian

Staff Present: Director Kerr, Director Hamilton, Chief Cornett, Chief Oliverius

2. Citizen's Comments -- none

3. Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes – May 6, 2025

MOTION: Council Member Streetman made a motion to approve the minutes of the May 6, 2025 meeting. Council Member Anderson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

4. Old Business -- none

5. New Business

A. Discussion of shark fishing/Seabrook Island ordinance

Committee members discussed the parts of the shark fishing ordinances from Seabrook Island and Horry County that they liked and disliked. After some discussion, Council Member Bogosian asked for staff to bring back a draft ordinance addressing no chumming (using Seabrook Island's definition), no drone deployment, no commercial fishing, and no intentional fishing and taking of sharks. He would also like to see some guidelines regarding surf fishing that mirror Seabrook Island's ordinance. Chief Cornett stated that guidelines are unenforceable.

B. Discussion of changes to noise regulations

Council Member Bogosian reviewed his suggested changes to the last year's failed noise ordinance that would modify the current noise ordinance with the intent of distinguishing between daytime and nighttime noise levels. He feels these changes make the ordinance more enforceable.

Council Member Streetman said he has concerns about the use of "reasonable" in the first paragraph and believes these changes make the ordinance more subjective and less clear.

Council Member Bogosian said he spoke with Chief Cornett about this at length and believes these changes address noise across the island and not just in relation to short-term rentals.

Council Member Anderson would like to see a specific decibel level (55 dBa) in the ordinance for nighttime noise levels.

Chief Cornett said that Code Enforcement would like “reasonable” to be in the ordinance. He also offered two other administrative changes. He added that loud noise and loud speaking at night is already being addressed. He is not sure that these proposed changes make it more enforceable, but it goes provide clearer definitions for court. He added that decibel levels along with measurement guidelines also aid in prosecuting noise complaints.

Further discussion of nighttime noise levels will be discussed at the July meeting.

C. Discussion of Breach Inlet signage parking

Administrator Kerr said that the City will be working with Sullivan’s Island to create and place unified signage at Breach Inlet to increase public awareness of the dangers of swimming in the area. Council Member Anderson said the signs should clearly be official signage so that visitors don’t mistake it for privately placed and it should be bilingual.

Discussion ensued as to the proper message and placement of the signs for maximum effect. The Committee would like to see “Don’t Swim Past This Point” on signs at the appropriate beach accesses and on the beach.

Chief Oliverius suggested City Council may want to discuss similar warning signage and better historical signage at Thompson Park once the work at Breach Inlet is complete. He said it is an opportunity to reduce risk and beautify the island.

Administrator Kerr will reach out to DNR about buoys in the area and SCDOT about signage on the bridge.

D. Discussion of golf cart regulations

Chief Cornett reviewed some of the new golf cart regulations signed into law by the Governor on May 22, 2025: owners must have a DMV decal and registration for the golf cart, and it must be with the cart; owners must have proof of insurance on their person, and all passengers under 12 must be properly restrained.

He added that municipalities now have the authority to designate official golf cart paths. He will bring an ordinance to the Committee next month to make the path along Palm Boulevard an official path.

Public Safety has been publicizing these changes via social media and reworking their golf cart brochure, which they will share with any business renting out golf carts. These updates were also shared at a recent Coffee with the Mayor.

E. Discussion of traffic issues

Council Member Anderson explained the traffic gridlock she was stuck in on Memorial Day weekend. She believes officers controlling the traffic flow at the light could have helped the situation.

Chief Cornett stated that he also sat in the traffic and monitored all the 511 cameras throughout the day. He said the problem exists with the volume of traffic leaving the island simultaneously as well as drivers' poor merging skills. He said he does not have enough staff to keep an officer directing traffic at the light.

Council Member Anderson suggested a traffic study be done on July 4th and make recommendations about managing traffic flow better. Administrator Kerr said he will speak with Stantech to see what can be organized by that weekend and the costs involved.

F. Discussion of public safety-related matrix recommendations

Administrator Kerr explained the organization of the matrix. He said the traffic flow and golf cart discussions were added to today's agenda via the recommendations on the matrix.

Council Member Bogosian and Administrator Kerr will group similar initiatives and then address 1-2 per meeting.

6. Miscellaneous Business

Council Member Streetman asked about painting the pedestrian crosswalk at 43rd and Palm. Chief Cornett said he mentioned it to Asst. Director Asero and will follow up with him.

Council Member Anderson stated that one of the "All Ways" signs is missing from the intersection at 41st Avenue.

The next meeting of the Public Safety Committee will be Tuesday, July 1, 2025 at 11:00am.

7. Adjournment

Council Member Bogosian made a motion to adjourn, and Council Member Streetman seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 12:18pm.

ORDINANCE 2025 – XX
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE 7 LICENSING AND REGULATION,
CHAPTER 3 BEACH AND MARINE RECREATION REGULATIONS,
ARTICLE A GENERAL PROVISIONS TO INCLUDE REGULATIONS ON
RECREATIONAL FISHING FROM SHORE AND PIER

WHEREAS, the City of Isle of Palms has a significant and growing number of visitors that use the beach for recreational uses that include fishing, swimming, and walking along the beaches within City Limits; and

WHEREAS, the intentional fishing, catching or attempting to catch sharks from the beach or shore endangers the public and poses a hazard to humans; and

WHEREAS, the Isle of Palms City Council finds that regulating recreational fishing from the beach or shore is imperative to the health, safety and welfare to residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, Isle of Palms City Council has the authority to enact new sections of its Code of Ordinances when deemed to be in the best interest of the citizens of the City, and now desires to do so as displayed below.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Councilmembers of the City of Isle of Palms, in Council assembled, that Section 7-3-2 be amended and 7-3-23 be included under Title 7, Chapter 3, Article A of the City of Isle of Palms Code of Ordinances as follows:

SECTION 1. That Section 7-3-2 “Definitions” be amended to state as follows:

Section 7-3-2 Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

(1) *Beach* means that area lying between the low-water mark of the Atlantic Ocean and the easternmost property line of the property owned by private individuals or corporations, lying closest in proximity to the Atlantic Ocean, and shall extend out from the mean low-water mark for a distance of three hundred (300) yards into the water. The term "beach" shall also include that area from the mean low-water mark for a distance of fifty (50) yards into the

water from the mouth of Breach Inlet to the seaward side of Breach Inlet Bridge and from the mouth to the midpoint of Dewees Inlet.

(2) *Boat* means any watercraft, including sea planes when not airborne, sailboats, jet skis, aqua-trikes or similar types of watercraft.

(3) *Designated areas* means any portion of the beach designated by the City Council for a special use, such as swimming, surfing, beaching of boats, etc.

(4) *Motorboat* means any boat operated through use of a motor or motorized propulsion, including jet skis, but excluding sailboats that use motors as an auxiliary means of propulsion.

(5) *Electric-assist bicycles and bicycles with helper motors* means lowspeed electrically assisted bicycles with two or three wheels, each having fully operable pedals and an electric motor of no more than 750 watts, or one horsepower, and a top motor-powered speed of less than twenty miles an hour when operated by a rider weighing one hundred seventy pounds on a paved level surface, that meet the requirements of the Federal Consumer Product Code provided in 16 C.F.R., Part 1512, and that operate in a manner such that the electric motor disengages or ceases to function when their brakes are applied or the rider stops pedaling.

(6) *Chumming* means the depositing into water chopped or ground bait consisting of raw meat or fish parts including blood and oil thereof (excluding chicken) in an attempt to catch fish.

(7) *Trot line* means a long fishing line with numerous hooks attached at intervals.

That Section 7-3-23 “Regulations on recreational fishing from shore or pier” be included to state as follows:

Section 7-3-23 Regulations on recreational fishing from shore or pier

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to intentionally attempt to catch or take any shark or other marine animals that may endanger the public from any fishing pier, or any beach, or shore.

(b) Chumming shall be unlawful within 600 feet of any fishing pier, or any beach or shore.

- (c) It shall be unlawful to use Unmanned Aerial Vehicles and/or drones for the purpose of delivering fishing lines, fishing bait or other manner of fishing from any fishing pier, or any beach or shore.
- (d) It shall be unlawful to use trot lines from any fishing pier, or any beach or shore.
- (e) Nothing in this section shall affect or prohibit the baiting of crab traps or the placement of natural bait upon a hook and line.
- (f) Nothing in this section shall apply to any agent of the City, County, State of South Carolina or Federal Agency lawfully engaged in official duties.
- (g) Police officers, Beach Services Officers, Code enforcement officers or any other appointed police department official shall have the authority to require persons engaged in fishing from the beach to cease fishing if, in their judgement, circumstances indicate that cessation of fishing is in the interest of public safety. In the event the official determines that fishing from the beach may be unsafe for other users of the beach, the official may order any person engaged in fishing from the beach to immediately cease fishing until such time as he or she indicates that it is safe to resume fishing. The official may indicate that fishing may occur at an alternative location on the beach during the time that the cease fishing order is effective. Failure to comply with an order of the police officer, Beach Services Officer, Code enforcement officer or any other appointed police department official shall be deemed a violation of this section.

SECTION 2. That should any part of this Ordinance be held invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining parts shall be severable therefrom and shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 3. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as the same affect this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. That this Ordinance take effect and be in full force immediately.

Isle of Palms Fishing Guidelines and Etiquette

1. Introduction

The City of Isle of Palms boasts seven miles of wide, pristine beaches great for swimming, lounging, fishing, biking and kayaking. The City of Isle of Palms has been a destination for beach goers for generations. If we can all adhere to these guidelines and basic etiquette, we will ensure that all individuals using the beaches can safely enjoy the beautiful natural resources that Isle of Palms offers.

2. Fish Species

Common species include red drum, black drum, flounder, croaker, whiting (southern kingfish), sheepshead, bluefish, lady fish, stingrays, spotted sea trout, tarpon, and blue crab.

3. License Requirements

- All individuals fishing in Isle of Palms marshes, creeks, inlets and tidal ponds must have a valid SC fishing license (<https://saltwaterfishing.sc.gov/license.html>) and comply with SC Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) regulations (<https://www.dnr.sc.gov/regulations.html>).
- Resident and non-resident licenses can be obtained online at SCDNR (<https://gooutdoorssouthcarolina.com/>). You can visit the SCDNR website (<https://www.dnr.sc.gov/purchase.html>) for additional information about obtaining licenses. To qualify for a resident fishing license, the applicant must have been a resident for the last 365 days. Short term licenses are available to non-residents at a reduced cost.

4. Fishing Locations

- Surf fishing along the beach. Breach Inlet is a popular fishing spot
 - Swimming or wading in breach inlet is dangerous and prohibited by ordinance.
- Isle of Palms Marina
- Intracoastal waterway
- There are several marshes in and around the Isle of Palms
- The Hunley bridge - Do not park on the street, exercise caution, and do not block the sidewalk.
- Fishing Charters: There are several charter captains at the Isle of Palms Marina as well as at the various Charleston Marinas.

- Fishermen?crabbers?shell.fisherman.and.boaters.should.be.considerate.of. each.other.and.treat.each.other.with.mutual.respect.so.all.can.enjoy.the. beach?lakes?streams?and.docks.and.cohabitate.peacefully.together;

5. Fish, Fishing Regulations

The SCDNR (www.dnr.sc.gov) has specific seasonal size and limit regulations that change from time to time. (<https://www.dnr.sc.gov/regulations.html>).

6. Crabbing Regulations

- Licenses: Recreational crab fishermen need a saltwater fishing license with a maximum of two crab pots (<https://saltwaterfishing.sc.gov/license.html>).
- Pots and traps must be marked with floats with the owner's name, address, and phone number and enough line to keep the float from going underwater at high tide.
- Traps should not be left where they could be exposed at low tide and should be checked daily. Unattended crab traps are death traps for crabs and other species and have negative impacts on our habitat.
- Proper crabbing practice depends on the type of trap used. Crab pots (sturdy structure with bait trap) should be removed within two days or less. Star, basket, net, and other traps are to be monitored and removed at the end of a fishing outing. Derelict (unattended) traps are subject to removal and disposal.
- Blue Crabs must be larger than five inches measured from the tip of one lateral spine across the back of the shell to the tip of the opposite lateral spine.
- Stone Crab claws must have a minimum forearm of 2¾ inches, and only crabs with two claws can have one removed. The larger of the two claws can be kept, but no claw can be removed from a female with eggs. Stone crab bodies cannot be possessed, live or dead.
- Crabbers should be cognizant and considerate of other users and keep equipment from cluttering the area. Do not leave equipment or tackle in the area, and clean up and remove all bait, lines, and other trash at the end of your crabbing outing.

7. Shell Fishing

- Shell fishing is only permitted within State and Recreational Shellfish Grounds. (<https://www.dnr.sc.gov/marine/shellfish/shellfishmaps.html>)
- Recreational Shell Fishing requires an SCDNR Saltwater Fishing License (<https://saltwaterfishing.sc.gov/license.html>)
- Limits: two bushels of oysters and/or one-half bushel of clams (>1 inch).

- The SCDNR publishes various approved areas, restricted areas, restricted equipment, and closure/open dates.
- Any discarded or open shells should be disposed of properly; do not leave shells in public areas.
 - An oyster shell recycling drop-off bin can be found at the Isle of Palms Marina.

8. Equipment Regulations

Permitted Equipment and Activities:

- Rods and Reels
- A fisherman may only use four rods and reels (SCDNR)
- A fisherman from a boat may use an unlimited number of rods (SCDNR)
- Hand Lines
- Kayak fishing
- Giggling
- Spear Fishing
- Cast Nets to collect bait fish
- Crab Traps (limit two per person)

Prohibited Equipment and Activities:

- No chumming within 600 feet of the beach. Prohibited by ordinance.
 - Definition: Chumming means the depositing into water chopped or ground bait consisting of raw meat or fish parts including blood and oil thereof (excluding chicken) in an attempt to catch fish.
 - This does NOT affect or prohibit the baiting of crab traps or the placement of natural bait upon a hook and line.
- Intentionally attempting to catch or take a shark from any fishing pier, beach or shore is prohibited.
- Trot lines are prohibited.
- No single-use plastics or Styrofoam products.
- No smoking (including vapes, e-cigs) on the beach or beach access paths
- No alcoholic beverages, glass containers, fires or fireworks.
- Fill in any holes before you leave.

9. Surf Fishing Guidelines

There are seven miles of beachfront and plenty of room for both fisherman and swimmers to enjoy the beaches of Isle of Palms.

- Fishermen should maintain a safe distance from swimmers
- Avoid casting near swimmers and be mindful of where your lines are in the water.
- If persons are swimming, fisherman should fish elsewhere (at a safe distance).
- If fishermen are present, swimmers should give them space (swim elsewhere at a safe distance).
- Fishermen and swimmers should be cognizant and considerate of each other, use common sense, and treat each other with mutual respect so all can enjoy the beach and cohabitate the shore peacefully together.

10. Bridge Fishing Guidelines/Safety Issues

- Be mindful of traffic when fishing from bridges.
- Do not obstruct the roadway or walkways.
- Be cautious of casting lines near pedestrians or vehicles; safety is a priority.

11. Post-Fishing Etiquette

- Clean Up: Ensure all trash, bait, and equipment are cleaned up and disposed of properly.
 - Remember, this island is a common nesting area for sea turtles. Trash and fishing equipment that is not disposed of safely can harm sea turtles and other wildlife.
- Bait: Do not leave bait on the beach or near fishing areas.
- Equipment: Store all equipment safely after use.
- Hooks: Properly dispose of hooks and other sharp objects to prevent injuries.
- Shellfish: Any discarded or open shells should be disposed of properly; do not leave shells in public areas.
 - An oyster shell recycling drop-off bin can be found at the Isle of Palms Marina.
- Fishermen and non-fisherman should be considerate of each other and treat each other with mutual respect so all can enjoy the beach and cohabitate the shore peacefully together.

12. Other Safety Guidelines

- Alligator Safety: Alligators are present in ponds and marsh areas and can occasionally be seen in the ocean. Maintain a safe distance and do not feed, harass, or attempt to hook an alligator. Be cautious of alligators if boating or kayaking in ponds or rivers. Do not dispose of or leave bait or fish near alligators. Report any aggressive alligator behavior to the Isle of Palms Police Department at 843.886.6522

- Dolphin Safety: Federal Law and the Isle of Palms Ordinance prohibit harassment of dolphins.
 - Keep your distance from dolphins, staying 15 yards away on land (50 yards by boat/kayak).
 - Do not try to feed dolphins. Keep quiet while dolphins are hunting or feeding.
 - No swimming if dolphins are strand feeding; avoid chasing, following, petting, circling dolphins or separating a mother and calf. If dolphins are beached, don't try to wade in, touch, grab, or mount them.

13. Police Department Officials Authorities

The Isle of Palms Police Department police officers, Animal Control Officers, Code Enforcement Officers and Beach Service Officers have the authority to issue warnings and to ask fisherman (or swimmers) to move if in their judgement they perceive there is a safety issue.

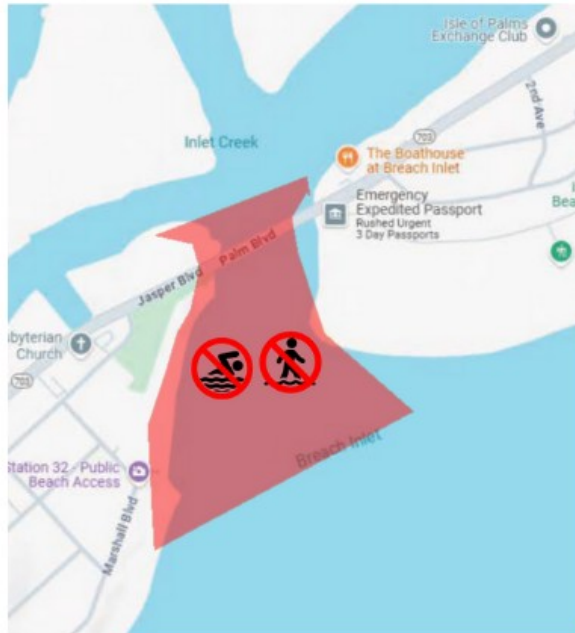
14. Conclusion

ORDINANCE 2025-05

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE 7, LICENSING AND REGULATION, CHAPTER 1 BUSINESS LICENSES, ARTICLE A GENERAL PROVISIONS, SECTION 7-1-15(F). SUSPENSION OR REVOCATION OF LICENSE OF THE CITY OF ISLE OF PALMS CODE OF ORDINANCES TO CHANGE THE PERIOD TO AMASS FIVE FOUNDED COMPLAINTS BEFORE A REVOCATION HEARING AND STIPULATE THAT TWO GARBAGE ROLL OUT COMPLAINTS ARE TO BE COUNTED AS ONE FOR PURPOSES OF LICENSE REVOCATION.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Councilmembers of the City of Isle of Palms, South Carolina, in City Council Assembled:

SECTION 1. That Section 7-1-15. Suspension or renovation of license. Subsection (F) is hereby amended to specifically read as follows:

F. A licensee has had five (5) or more complaints of unlawful activity within a rolling 365-day period that are determined to be founded by the Police Department; provided that ~~two (2)~~ founded complaints of Section 3-2-8. Garbage roll-out carts and county recycling containers shall not be kept upon street or road right-of-way, shall not be counted ~~as one (1) founded complaint~~ for purposes of this subsection.

SECTION 2. To avoid counting founded complaints that have already expired under the previous review period of the calendar year, no founded complaints documented before January 1, 2025 should be counted for purposes of Section 7-1-15(F).

SECTION 3. Should any part of this Ordinance be held invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining parts shall be severable therefrom and shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 43. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as the same affect this Ordinance.

SECTION 54. That this Ordinance take effect immediately upon approval by City Council.

Sec. 3-2-8. - Garbage roll-out carts and county recycling containers shall not be kept upon street or road rights-of-way.

Garbage roll-out carts and county recycling containers shall not be placed in the right-of-way of a street or road except when placed for collection. Garbage carts and recycling containers shall not be placed for collection prior to 5:00 p.m. on the day before collection. Garbage carts and recycling containers shall be removed from the right-of-way no later than 9:00 a.m. on the day following collection. Except for such times when lawfully placed for collection, no garbage carts or recycling containers shall be allowed to remain clearly visible from a street, road, or right-of-way. Garbage carts and recycling containers located on publicly owned areas, including, but not limited to, public parking lots, public parks, public beach and recreational areas, or any City-owned property, are exempt from the requirements of this section. The City has the right to move garbage carts and recycling containers placed in violation of this section.

Editor's note— Ord. No. 2013-03, § 1, adopted May 28, 2013, changed the title of § 3-2-8 from garbage roll-out carts shall not be kept upon street or road rights-of-way to garbage roll-out carts and county recycling containers shall not be kept upon street or road rights-of-way.

ORDINANCE 2024 – XX
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE 9 OFFENSES, CHAPTER 2 OFFENSES
AGAINST PUBLIC PEACE, TO INCLUDE REGULATIONS ON HATE
INTIMIDATION

WHEREAS, the residents and visitors of the City of Isle of Palms are a diverse collection of individuals representing a multitude of races, colors, creeds, religions, ancestries, sexual orientations, genders, gender identities, physical and mental disabilities, and national origins; and

WHEREAS, the City of Isle of Palms values and wishes to protect its residents and visitors irrespective of their race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical or mental disability, or national origin; and

WHEREAS, crimes that are motivated by bias or hate towards any person or persons, in whole or in part, because of the actual or perceived race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, physical or mental disability, or national origin of any person are an affront to the values held by the City; and

WHEREAS, the State of South Carolina has yet to adopt a statewide Hate Crime Legislation, and is only one of two states in the United States who have yet to adopt such protections for its citizens and visitors; and

WHEREAS, the City of Isle of Palms desires to enact a new section of its Code of Ordinances in order to protect its residents and visitors and deter crimes motivated by bias or hate towards any person or persons, in whole or in part, because of the actual or perceived race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, physical or mental disability, or national origin of any person, and provide separate appropriate penalties in addition to the punishment for the underlying violation of the ordinances of the City; and

WHEREAS, Isle of Palms City Council has the authority to enact new sections of its Code of Ordinances when deemed to be in the best interest of the citizens of the City, and now desires to do so as displayed below.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Councilmembers of the City of Isle of Palms, in Council assembled, Section 9-2-7 of the City of Isle of Palms Code of Ordinances titled Hate Intimidation is hereby enacted to specifically read as follows:

9-2-7 HATE INTIMIDATION.

(a) A person who violates Title 9 of the City of Isle of Palms Code of Ordinances, any act or omission which is prohibited or declared unlawful under this Code of Ordinances, or any provision of State law within the municipal limits of the City of Isle of Palms, with the intent to intimidate a person or persons, in whole or in part, because of the actual or perceived race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical or mental disability, or national origin of any person is guilty of the separate offense of hate intimidation and shall be punished as provided in item (b) here within. Sentences shall run consecutive to one another unless the Court specifies on the record good cause why they should run concurrently. The trier of fact whether, a jury or the Municipal Judge if the defendant waives his/her right to a jury trial, must find the defendant guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. A person cannot be found guilty of Hate Intimidation unless he/she is first convicted under the underlying crime and Hate Intimidation may not be used as a standalone crime.

(b) Fines imposed under this section for contemporaneous or concurrent violations of this section shall be assessed for each violation,

(1) A violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of not more than \$500.00 and/or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days. The sentence imposed must be consecutive to the sentence for the underlying criminal offense unless the Court articulates on the record the reasons why the sentences should run concurrently.

(2) The Court may impose community service or participation in an educational program for violation of this Section.

(3) Any sentence may be suspended upon completion by the defendant of appropriate education, counseling or community service employment as ordered by the Court.

(4) The Court may also designate all or part of the imposed fine be directed to the support of programs designed to combat bias based on ethnicity, national origin, color, religion, sexual orientation, gender

and gender identity or physical or mental disability.

(c) Restitution authorized. In addition to the penalties provided for above, the Court may order restitution up to the limits of the Court's jurisdiction for damages sustained by the victim of this offense directly related to the commission of the crime which may include compensation for medical bills, counseling or therapy or damage to property sustained by the victim as a result of the underlying criminal offense.

WHEREAS, in order to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens and visitors of the City of Isle of Palms, City Council desires to authorize the Mayor to express to the South Carolina General Assembly, the City of Isle of Palms' support for H.3620, "Clementa C. Pinckney Hate Crime Act."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY OF ISLE OF PALMS CITY COUNCIL THAT:

The City Council of the City of Isle of Palms hereby authorizes the Mayor to express its support for H.3620, "Clementa C. Pinckney Hate Crime Act."

Mr. Mayor and members of the Isle of Palms Public Safety Committee,

My husband and I live just outside Wild Dunes on Palm Boulevard. We have been on IOP since 2019, and we've been full time residents for the past two years or so. In my life I have often hesitated to speak out about personal experiences of hatred directed at my family, feeling that acknowledging such actions only gave them more power. However, as I've grown older, I've come to understand the importance of bringing these issues to light. Without doing so, many in our community—even those who support us—may never be fully aware of what continues to happen around them.

This week, I turn 49 years old, the same age Matthew Shepard would have been had he not been brutally murdered in 1998. His tragic death left an indelible mark on me as a boy of the same age, making me acutely aware that my existence could be threatened by those who believed I had no right to live authentically. While much progress has been made in the years since, recent events remind me that underlying hatred still exists.

On Easter weekend this year, young men trespassed onto our porch in the dead of night, pulling down and attempting to destroy our pride flag. This is the second time we've experienced such an act, and though I had reinforced the flagpole to withstand damage, their efforts to break it were accompanied by homophobic slurs. The video of this incident captures their actions and is deeply unsettling.

When I heard that a Hate Crime Law was under consideration, I felt compelled to share our experience. I do not believe these individuals are a reflection of our neighbors, but as a tourist destination, I think it's crucial that we send a clear message: our community welcomes everyone equally and expects visitors to treat it with the same respect.

Sec. 8-2-31. Obedience to parking regulations.

- (a) Vehicles with resident parking permits or special permits parking within a resident parking district shall observe and obey the parking regulations posted within the district and as set forth in section 8-2-2 and sections 8-2-4 through 8-2-6 of this chapter, including, but not limited to, the prohibitions on parking in the following places or manners:
- (1) On a sidewalk;
 - (2) In front of the entrance to a public or private driveway or alleyway, or within twenty feet (20') of the driveway entrance to any fire station;
 - (3) Within an intersection or within twenty-five feet (25') of the center of an intersection;
 - (4) Within thirty feet (30') of a stop sign;
 - (5) Within fifteen feet (15') of a fire hydrant or fire safety sprinkler, standpipe, or other fire protection system control valve, whether such valve is mounted on a building or on the ground;
 - (6) Along any street curb painted yellow;
 - (7) On a crosswalk or within twenty feet (20') of the center of any crosswalk;
 - (8) More than eighteen inches (18") from the street curb;
 - (9) On the street pavement if there is no street curb, except as otherwise marked or posted. Vehicles shall be parked in such a manner so that all four (4) tires are off of the street;
 - (10) In the opposite direction of the movement of traffic;
 - (11) Alongside or opposite any street excavation or obstruction when doing so would obstruct traffic or interfere with the excavation;
 - (12) On the roadway side of any vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of a street, sometimes called "double parking";
 - (13) In any parking space designated and established for use by disabled persons unless the vehicle properly displays special designating plate or a placard issued and valid under state law;
 - (14) In a manner that blocks traffic or interferes with or blocks the passage of other vehicles;
 - (15) At any place where official signs prohibit stopping, standing, or parking; or in any manner that violates any official sign or curb marking regulating stopping, standing, or parking;
 - (16) A. Along the rights-of-way of Palm Boulevard between 21st Avenue and 40th Avenue in any of the following manners:
 1. Within four (4) feet of the pavement, except as otherwise posted;
 2. In any manner other than angled parking in the designated marked spaces on the land side of Palm Boulevard;
 3. In any manner other than parallel parking in the direction of traffic on the ocean side of Palm Boulevard and;
 4. Double parking on the passenger side of any vehicle that is parallel parked along the right-of-way on the ocean side of Palm Boulevard.
 - B. Along the rights-of-way of Palm Boulevard between 42nd and 53rd Avenue in any of the following manners:

-
1. Within four (4) feet of the pavement, except as otherwise posted;
 2. In any manner other than parallel parking in the direction of traffic; and
 3. Double parking on the passenger side of any vehicle that is paralleled parked along the right-of-way.

(17) On a beach access as defined in section 5-4-15(C)(1), or on a public right-of-way in such a manner as to obstruct pedestrian use or authorized emergency vehicular use of a beach access.

- (b) No such resident parking permit or special permit shall exempt a vehicle from any regulation related to parking in the commercial districts or to paid parking spaces, parking pay stations and kiosks along the public streets or in the public parking lots; provided, however, that City Council may designate certain times for vehicles with valid resident parking permits to park in the public parking lots free of charge.
- (c) Parking a truck or vehicle having an overall length of more than twenty feet (20') at any point, including trailers, is prohibited upon any street right-of-way in a resident parking district for more than one (1) hour or as long as is reasonably necessary to load or unload passengers or materials, ~~except that vehicles displaying a valid resident parking permit shall be permitted to park with attached boat trailers along the rights of way of 41st Avenue from Waterway Boulevard to the terminus of 41st Avenue, where parking is not otherwise prohibited, for access to the Isle of Palms Marina.~~
