**PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE**  
5:00 p.m., Monday, July 2, 2018

The regular meeting of the Public Safety Committee was called to order at 5:00 p.m., Monday, July 2, 2018 in the City Hall Conference Room, 1207 Palm Boulevard, Isle of Palms, South Carolina. Present for the meeting were Councilmembers Bell and Ward, Chair Smith, Interim Police Chief Usry, Battalion Chief Smith, Interim City Administrator Fragoso and Clerk Copeland. A quorum was present to conduct business.

1. Chair Smith called the meeting to order and acknowledged that the press and public were duly notified of the meeting in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act.

2. **Approval of Previous Meeting's Minutes**

**MOTION: Councilmember Bell moved to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of June 4, 2018 as submitted; Councilmember Ward seconded.**

Chair Smith directed attention to paragraph 4 on page 4 of the minutes and asked that the final sentence be changed to read as follows:

She stated that her goal was to have any dog ordinance change recommendations . . .

The Chair also requested a change to paragraph 5 on page 5 so that it reads as follows:

Chair Smith proposed considering that Breach Inlet . . .

**VOTE on Changes to the Minutes: The changes PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.**

Chair Smith explained that she makes such suggestions because she hopes that the Committee members come to the meetings with open minds ready to receive input from staff and fellow Committee members in order to make the best decisions for the City.

**VOTE in Minutes as Amended: The amended motion PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.**

3. **Citizens' Comments**

Elizabeth Campsen, 32 Intracoastal Court, thanked the Committee for its efforts in protecting the residential neighborhoods around the Marina. (The full text of Ms. Campsen's comments is attached to the historical record of the meeting.)

Chris Donovan, 31 – 26<sup>th</sup> Avenue, noted that she sent letters to members of Council and was encouraged by their feedback. She read a short portion of her letter into the minutes of the meeting saying:

"I am well aware of the growth in our area, that change comes with growth, and that our laws and ordinances must address the change. However, I do not believe that friendliness of our island or the commonsense of our public employees need to be sacrificed during these changes."

(The text of Ms. Donovan's comments are attached to the historical record of the meeting.) Ms. Donovan was responding to a bevy of tickets issued to vehicles which were clearly parked there

while visiting residents of the homes. She asked that, in areas of the island where parking is not an issue, enthusiastic parking enforcement officers should not create one.

#### 4. Old Business

##### A. Update on Managed Beach Parking Plan

- Update on parking hangtags and daily visitor parking pass booklets

Interim City Administrator Fragoso recounted that City Council had approved the changes to the Managed Beach Parking Plan at the meeting of June 26, 2018; the changes include parallel parking on both sides of Palm Boulevard between 21<sup>st</sup> Avenue and 40<sup>th</sup> Avenue, no double parking on the passenger side of any vehicle parallel parked along the right-of-way, and enforcing the parking plan year-round. The RFB for the fabrication and installation of new signs was advertised the following day with a deadline for questions of July 12<sup>th</sup> and bid opening on July 23<sup>rd</sup>. Staff plans to study the bids and make a recommendation for a bid award at the next meeting. She noted that funding for the signs was included in the FY19 Municipal Accommodations Tax budget.

Interim Chief Usry met with Chair Smith to be certain that Police Department staff members were moving in the same direction as the Committee. She commented that the Department issues residents the residential stickers and will give the owner a single booklet of thirty (30) visitor passes. She noted that she inquired what the purpose of the hang tags was to be and what they would be replacing, and she remains unsure about what they would do. As stated at the June meeting, the booklets of thirty (30) passes cost the City approximately one dollar eighty cents (\$1.80), or six cents (\$0.06) per coupon. If the hang tags were to be distributed the same as the coupon booklets, the cost would be approximately twenty-three dollars (\$23); therefore, the Interim Chief's recommendation was to stay with the coupon booklets. The residents have become accustomed to them and use them effectively, and they are easily visible to officers. Since the parking plan will now be enforced year-round, she also recommended giving residents two (2) free coupon books.

Councilmember Bell stated that he followed up with Ms. Donovan and visited her to see what had been done. As a result, he opined that Council needed to hold another post-season evaluation of the parking plan to know if other tweaks need to be made to the ordinance. For families with children returning to the island from college, he thought it would be logical to get residential stickers for their vehicles eliminating confusion. He stated that the ordinance exists to protect the residents when there is a problem, but, for areas without problems, he suggested that the BSOs be trained to use their judgement in the internal neighborhoods before automatically writing tickets. This would allow BSOs to double-down on the problem areas like 41<sup>st</sup> Avenue, Waterway Boulevard, Front Beach, etc.

Chair Smith agreed to abandon the hang tag idea due to the added expense, but she agreed with Interim Chief Usry that residents should be given two (2) booklets since the parking plan is now enforceable twelve (12) months a year.

**MOTION:" Councilmember Bell moved to give residents two (2) visitor parking booklets; Chair Smith seconded.**

Interim Administrator Fragoso stated that the FY19 budget did not anticipate giving residents two (2) visitor parking booklet and that staff needed to determine if it was affordable.

Councilmember Ward said that he would not support this action until he knew where the funding was coming from.

**AMENDMENT:** Councilmember Ward amended the motion to include that the implementation of this action would be contingent upon finding a place in the budget where it can be funded without creating an over-budget condition; Councilmember Bell seconded and the amendment PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Councilmember Ward asked the Committee members to act cautiously and reminded them that the parking ordinances were passed in response to the citizen's demands. In his opinion, the ordinances should be enforced island-wide or not enforced at all.

When asked to describe the process in place for enforcement of the parking regulations, Interim Chief Usry stated that, at the beginning of each shift, the BSO's are assigned an area of the island to work; on the weekends, the full contingent of BSOs are assigned to Front Beach. On an average day, the BSO rides his area and, when he has completed the route, he starts over again; typically after lunch, the areas are shifted.

Chait Smith asked if the BSOs were more concentrated in problem areas of the island.

The Interim Chief said that traffic issues at Front Beach require four or five (4 – 5) BSOs to keep vehicles moving, leaving four (4) BSOs to work the neighborhoods, and this only happens when a full contingent of BSOs is working. Since they are required to work on the weekends, they are given days off during the week.

**VOTE:** The amended motion PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

**B. Update on assistance for doctors on-call to exist the island when responding to emergencies**

When conferring with Attorney Halversen, they learned that a bill is before the General Assembly to allow physicians to have rotating green lights on the dash of their vehicles; the bill has been stuck in the Committee for Education and Public Works since January 2018. Interim Chief Usry suggested that, if it was the will of the policy-setting body, individual members of Council and the Mayor could send letters to the City's representatives in the legislature in support for this bill.

The Interim Chief also informed the Committee that the City's insurance carrier has advised against escorting a doctor off the island due to the liability to the City.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Ward moved to suspend the rules and to discuss item D under New Business at this time; Councilmember Bell seconded and the motion PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Ward moved to suspend the rules to invite the stakeholders to come forward to join the discussion; Chair Smith seconded and the motion PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

**5. New Business**  
**D. Discussion of surfing lessons on the beach**

The stakeholders in this venture were invited to join the Committee for the discussion, and Marshall Depass, Kyle Busey and Ross Appel, attorney with the McCullough Khan, LLC firm, came forward.

Having presented their request, Council charged staff with looking at all of the options available to the City that might allow surfing lessons to be taught on the beach, and Councilmember Bell asked if anything temporary could be done to allow Mr. Busey to operate his business as soon as possible so that he would not lose the entire summer season. As a result of conferring with Attorney Halversen and Director Kerr, Interim Administrator Fragoso stated that he could seek City-sponsored event status for the balance of the season; a precedent to allow this was established when Morgan Creek Grill was given City-sponsored event status as they were building the sound stage and tweaking equipment to resume outdoor music while the City worked on the noise ordinance. It would be a one time approval, and he would be required to meet the terms established for a City-sponsored event, and the City could add additional conditions if it thought they were necessary, for instance, the location on the beach the lessons were to be given, the work hours, etc. To expedite a decision would require a Special City Council meeting. For a more permanent solution, the City staff advised that entering into a franchise agreement would be the most appropriate approach; the City could offer an exclusive franchise agreement or offer more than one (1) franchise. The franchise agreement would take longer to make happen, but would give the City more control over how the business was operated since the City could include stipulations about the business, would bring revenue to the City, as well as indemnify the City through its insurance coverage. The optimum and fairest way to offer a franchise would be through issuing a Request for Proposal (RFP), for which Folly Beach provides a good example; to do this would also require an amendment to the current ordinance.

Councilmember Bell opined that the only way Council would approve this request would be for the surfing lessons to be given only in Wild Dunes because the business has a contract with Wild Dunes and only at the Boardwalk in Wild Dunes. He asked if the RFP could require that the proposers to have a contract with Wild Dunes. He also questioned if granting Carolina Salt Surfing a temporary status was corrupting the bid process that could damage the company in the long term.

Interim Administrator Fragoso replied that research was ongoing about how narrowly the RFP can be written.

Marshall Depass introduced their attorney Ross Appel who has spoken with Attorney Halversen about the possible RFP, and he stated that he “wholeheartedly agrees with staff with their decision about what the options were for the near-term as well as the long-term.” He said that they were aware that this was a sensitive issue and were happy that they have gotten as far along in the discussion as they have. He explained that one (1) way they considered packaging their request was have it as a pilot program from which the City could gather information while it considers the best course of action for the long-term.

When Councilmember Smith asked for more of an explanation of Mr. Busey’s plans, he would teach surfing between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. in Wild Dunes from Memorial Day to Labor Day; the classes would be an hour and a half to two hours (1.5 – 2 hrs.) in length with one (1) person in each session.

Councilmember Smith expressed the opinion that to grant the surfing lessons City-sponsored event status was stretching the intent on the classification and setting a bad precedent.

Councilmember Bell stated that Council was opposed to granting a license as a City-sponsored event that would exist in perpetuity; the Councilmember then asked if there was a legal way the City could allow Carolina Salt Surfing to operate this year that Council could be comfortable with. The use of City-sponsored event status was not being discussed in the same context as it was at the Council meeting; the consideration was much more in-line with the City's previous use of the term with Morgan Creek Grill a few years ago. In this case, the request for City-sponsored event status would be a one-time request without changing any of the rules for a City-sponsored event.

**MOTION: Councilmember Ward moved to grant Carolina Salt Surfing Lessons City-sponsored event status through the end of this year; Councilmember Bell seconded.**

Councilmember Ward indicated that it would be unfair to keep them dangling to the end of this month or longer; he voiced the desire to give them the benefit of the doubt and see how it works out through the end of the summer.

Councilmember Smith said that she has made it known that she was in favor of the City finding a way to provide surfing instruction, but she wanted to ensure that the City does it the right way. She told Mr. Busey that she was very impressed with his qualifications.

Interim Administrator Fragoso queried the Committee about adding any kind of stipulations to granting City-sponsored event status and asked the stakeholders in Carolina Salt Surfing to provide the City with a written proposal for review before City Council would make any decisions.

**VOTE: The motion PASSED on a vote of 2 to 1 with Chair Smith casting the dissenting vote.**

**C. Update on emergency lights and sirens for volunteer firefighters**

Chief Graham reported that she has communicated with the City's insurance carrier and the City Attorney; the insurance company did not recommend that the City follow this course although it was legal. If the City should decide to go forward, the insurance company recommended that the City maintain insurance described as 100/300/100. In addition, they provided the City with a form used by another local government that requires that the driver complete a driver's training class offered by the South Carolina Fire Academy, maintain a minimum of insurance, and have both lights and sirens; if the insurance is terminated for any reason, the use of the lights and sirens must stop. Chief Graham stated that she would prefer to have the support of the full Council before any change was made because it would impact the City's insurance rates.

**MOTION: Councilmember Bell moved to recommend to City Council that, under the direction of the Fire Chief and at her discretion, to allow certain volunteer firefighters to outfit their vehicles with lights and sirens provided they have the required insurance; Chair Smith seconded and the motion PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.**

The Chief's recommendation was that the City not pay for the lights and sirens for volunteers.

**D. Status on process for undertaking the Public Safety Building repairs and results of air quality test**

On the air quality testing, Chief Graham reported that she had met with a local individual, but he has not performed the test yet; she was waiting on a price quote. She has decided that, in order to speed up the process, she would contact another company; the firm that was highly recommended did not show up for the appointment.

On the process for undertaking the repairs to the building, Director Kerr, Chief Graham and Interim Administrator Fragoso have met and were working on a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for the design and construction oversight. The firm selected would assist with the preparation of the package to go to the construction companies who would do the work. The goal was to advertise the RFQ by the end of July.

The Public Safety Committee agreed to move the issue of the repair and construction needed for the Public Safety Building to the Real Property Committee; the Public Safety Committee will be kept apprised of the progress.

Chief Graham explained that the RFQ would be published with broad parameters; the top two to four (2 – 4) bidders would be interviewed and would participate in a mandatory walk-through. The company chosen will assist the City with selecting a design/build team.

**5. New Business**

**A. Discussion of traffic counts on 41<sup>st</sup> Avenue, Waterway and Palm Boulevards**

Councilmember Bell stated that he had gone through minutes of old meetings looking for traffic counts and only found data from October 2016 when the traffic counter was set up on 41<sup>st</sup> Avenue; it recorded approximately eleven thousand one hundred (11,100) vehicles travelling in both directions in this seven (7) day period. The Councilmember was interested in seeing the traffic counts this summer to look at how the numbers have changed; in addition, he would like to know just how many vehicles were going into the marina; he anticipated the volume to be “outrageously high.” Based on the number of concerned citizens, he would like to project how the operation of the new hotel was going to impact the traffic on Palm Boulevard.

Interim Chief Usry stated that she would ask SCDOT if they would assist City by lending traffic counters; additionally, she reminded the Committee that replacement traffic counters for the end of the Connector and Breach Inlet are in the FY19 budget. The counters at the Connector will indicate the number of vehicles that are turning left or right and going straight.

When the Interim Chief asked if the Councilmember wanted the traffic counters placed at specific locations, he noted that the Committee was certainly interested in containing the volume at the marina.

Relative to traffic flowing into Wild Dunes, Chair Smith thought a counter should be placed near the first gate into the resort.

**B. Discussion of public safety at the marina**

Chair Smith explained that this Agenda item came from an experience shared by a group of people that included her and her family. She recounted that, on June 10<sup>th</sup>, she and her family

were enjoying a day of boating when a storm suddenly came up causing them to seek shelter at the IOP Marina. They joined several other boats docking in spaces leased by the Marina Manager near Morgan Creek Grill; once docked, her family and the other boaters sought safety to wait out the storm, but they found that the gate into the marina was locked and required a key to open. The Chair stated that they were following a safe harbor boating principle stating that a boater in a dangerous situation should be allowed to dock in any open dock space. Representatives of both the marina and Morgan Creek Grill were present and the Chair asked that they come forward to join the discussion; she wanted to insure that her situation was not repeated.

Councilmember Bell commented that he received several emails regarding this incident saying that they were denied safe harbor, that they were waved off because a big boat was coming in and that no one seemed to have the code for the gate.

Chair Smith explained that the gate was next to the Morgan Creek bar, but the bartender did not have the code to open it. As the storm got closer, the boaters were climbing over the fence to find shelter.

Chris Wukovitz, floor manager on duty at Morgan Creek Grill at the time of the incident, and Brian Berrigan, Marina Manager, were attending the meeting to assist in finding the best way to keep this sort of thing from repeating itself.

Based on a conversation between Mr. Berrigan and Chair Smith, the Chair stated that Mr. Berrigan had agreed to share the code to the gate with the bartending staff at the restaurant. Mr. Wukovitz commented that he and Mr. Clarke, owner of Morgan Creek Grill, talked with Mr. Berrigan earlier in the day about sharing the code with the five (5) floor managers at the restaurant.

Mr. Berrigan stated that the Marina has a written safety policy relative to emergency response to weather, and he stated that the policy does address weather, but it does not address situations like the one Chair Smith and others had. As a part of the public safety policy, the gate code was changed monthly; when he notifies the Fire and Police Department of the new code, he will include the management of Morgan Creek Grill.

Councilmember Bell asked the marina manger to explain the policy for temporary docking.

Since Morgan Creek Grill has been assigned docks at the marina, Mr. Berrigan asked that they do a better job of managing them and not to let patrons in just because they have the code since it is designed to be for an emergency. At the time Chair Smith was seeking refuge from the storm, public dock space was open according to Mr. Berrigan, but, under the circumstances, he understood that they went to the first open slip they saw.

### **C. Discussion of ideas for public transit and seasonal shuttle to IOP**

Councilmember Ward noted that he was now a member of the CARTA Board, and, at the last meeting, they discussed the new Park 'n Ride system in Downtown Charleston that has been quite successful. From his understanding, residents of the outlying areas, i.e. North Charleston, Awendaw, etc., park in the designated parking lot for five dollars (\$5) per day and get on the shuttle that operates on the quarter hour making a wide loop through downtown; the shuttle is aimed at commuters who work downtown in hospitality services and operates from 6:00 a.m. to 3:00 a.m.

Councilmember Ward stated that this is a big picture project for CARTA, and he asked that it stay on the Agenda for future meetings so that he will have the support of City Council to go to the CARTA Chairman noting the City's support and asking how the City could benefit.

Problems CARTA is facing are finding a space in Mount Pleasant for the parking lot that would be affordable and educating the people. He understands that the only fee the commuters pay is the five dollars (\$5) for parking, and the bus ride is free. Federal funds are available for this type of service.

The Councilmember added that he sees the service as the solution to a multitude of problems on the beach. He recalled that CARTA had tried a route to IOP in the past, but people were reluctant to use it because they brought so much paraphernalia for their visit to the beach. (He noted that some beach communities have banned the tents, chairs and umbrellas that visitors bring to the beach, for instance Hilton Head and Myrtle Beach.)

Councilmember Bell suggested that the City form partnerships to solve some of its problems, and it will require some form of public transportation; he opined that no one would take public transportation to the beach until the City starts to charge for parking island-wide. The ordinance passed at the last Council meeting that mandates parallel parking on Palm Boulevard from 21<sup>st</sup> to 40<sup>th</sup> Avenues will dramatically reduce the number of parking spaces, and people are going to complain. To make the changes more palatable, the City must work with CARTA, adjoining communities and others to make getting to and from the beach easy. At the end of the season, he would like to see Council put in the time to develop a comprehensive view of the parking issues on the island that will clearly indicate that problem A contributes to problem B, etc., and that to solve one (1) problem will not necessarily ease or eliminate problem B.

Chair Smith asked that this subject be on the September Agenda.

#### **E. Consideration of revised Chief of Police job description**

Interim Administrator Fragoso stated that staff was hoping to get feedback on the job description for the Chief of Police that was included in meeting packets; the goal of the Personnel Committee is to present an approved version to City Council for adoption at the July meeting.

Having studied it, Councilmember Bell asked if this job description was consistent with one from other local governments of the same size, particularly Sullivan's Island.

Interim Administrator Fragoso noted that, before the job descriptions for the Chief of Police and City Administrator are submitted to City Council for adoption, they will be reviewed by the City's labor attorney.

#### **6. Highlights of Departmental Reports**

The monthly reports for the Police and Fire Departments are posted in full on the City's website.

Interim Chief Usry announced that the Police Department has partnered with Palmetto Pride and Charleston County Parks and Recreation for an IOP Beach Clean-up on Thursday, July 5<sup>th</sup> from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.; she said that thirty to forty (30 – 40) people have signed up, but more than one hundred fifty (150) have expressed interest in participating.

Councilmember Bell asked if the Police Department tracked golf cart citations separately. Interim Chief Usry stated that golf cart citations were difficult to track because some dispatchers enter them as a traffic stop and others go in as suspicious activity, citizens' complaints or contact with. The software does not allow reports to be generated by type of vehicle.

Councilmember Bell asked if a method for tracking them could be devised because it was clear that visitors have no idea that the driver should hold a valid driver's license. He stated that residents are noticing and asking what is being done to stop it.

The Interim Chief stated that a couple of residents were renting golf carts from their homes and officers could verify that their customers were receiving proper training before leaving with it.

Chair Smith recommended that information about the use of golf carts be posted to the City's website.

**7. Miscellaneous Business**

The Committee agreed not to meet in August.

The next Public Safety Committee meeting will be at 10:00 a.m., Wednesday, September 5, 2018 in the Conference Room.

**8. Executive Session – not needed**

**9. Adjournment**

**MOTION: Councilmember Bell moved to adjourn the meeting at 6:52 p.m.; Councilmember Ward seconded and the motion PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.**



# DOG PERMITTING ORDINANCE

Permitting Requirement Options for  
Dog Owners on the Isle of Palms

# Current Isle of Palms Ordinance

**IOP Sec. 6-2-11. - Permit required.**

It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep or harbor a dog within the City without a written permit from the City.

(Code 1970, § 5-4; Code 1994, § 6-2-11; Ord. No. 2004-4, § 1, 5-25-2004)

**\*Not clear as to residents or visitors\***

# IOP Sec. 6-2-12. - Certificate of vaccination required prior to permit issuance; term

Before issuing the permit required by this article, the City shall require the applicant to show proof of a current, valid rabies inoculation signed by a licensed veterinarian. Each permit shall be good for one (1) year from the date of its issue, and no longer.

(Code 1994, § 6-2-12; Ord. No. 1994-4, 4-26-1994; Ord. No. 2004-4, § 2, 5-25-2004)

# **IOP Sec. 6-2-13. - Badges; records.**

The City shall annually provide a sufficient number of metal badges suitable for dogs to be fastened to the animal's collar, numbered from one upwards, stamped "dog permit" and the year of issue. This badge and the written permit shall be delivered to the person owning, keeping or harboring the dog. The name and address of each party to whom such permit and badge has been issued shall be kept on file by the City, for the purpose of identification in case such badges should at any time be lost, stolen or otherwise misappropriated.

A. It shall be unlawful for any person, resident or visitor, to own, keep, harbor, or allow a dog within the limits of the Town of Sullivan's Island, or exercise, walk, or allow a dog on public properties without a written permit/badge from the Town Clerk. (2-15-05)

B. Before issuing a permit required by Sec. 3-7 A. above, the Town Clerk shall require the applicant to file with him a certificate in writing signed by a licensed veterinarian that the dog designated in the permit has been vaccinated against rabies within one (1) year immediately preceding the date of the application. Each permit shall be valid for the calendar year commencing January 1 of each year, and no longer.

C. The Town Clerk shall annually provide a sufficient number of metal badges suitable for dogs to be fastened to the animal's collar, numbered from one upwards, and stamped "Dog Permit" and year of issue. This badge and the written permission required in Sec. 3-7 A shall be delivered to the person owning, keeping, or harboring the dog upon the payment of the sum of \$25.00 for residents of the Town and \$35.00 for non-residents of the Town of Sullivan's Island. (11-16-04) (11-17-09)

D. With submittal of an American Kennel Club Canine Good Citizenship Certificate at the time of application, applicant shall receive a \$2.00 discount off the applicable annual fee for each certified dog. (11-17-09)

# Town of Mount Pleasant



**§ 90.54 COLLAR; TAG MUST BE WORN.** It shall be unlawful for any person to maintain or keep a dog or cat more than six months of age on any premises within the town unless the dog or cat wears a collar or harness securely attached to its body to which shall be securely attached a tag issued for the dog or cat by a licensed veterinarian, licensed to practice veterinary medicine in the state, showing the dog or cat has been vaccinated against rabies. ('81 Code, § 90.29) (Ord. 93050, passed 10-12-93; Am. Ord. 01031, passed 6-12-01) Penalty, see § 10.99

## § 95.09 ANIMAL TAGS.

(A) An animal services officer shall annually provide a sufficient number of metal tags, suitable for animals to be fastened to the animal's collar. This tag shall be delivered to the person holding, keeping or harboring the animal, upon payment of a sum as fixed from time to time by the City Council. The name and address of the person to whom the tag has been issued shall be kept on file in the animal services officer's office for the purpose of identification in case the tag should be at any time lost, stolen or otherwise misappropriated. It is further provided that this section shall not apply to persons living in the city temporarily for a period of less than 30 days; however, the person is not relieved of the responsibility under the other sections of this chapter.

(B) If the license tag is lost, a new tag may be issued for a fee as established from time to time by the City Council.

(C) Senior citizens, 55 years of age or older, will be allowed to register their animals free of charge.

## § 95.11 RABIES VACCINATION.

No person shall own, keep or harbor any pet within the city unless the pet has been vaccinated against rabies as provided herein.

(A) Unless the pet has received (as evidenced by certificate) a vaccination from a licensed graduate veterinarian using a vaccine which is good for a period of one year, provided the vaccine has been approved with the longer period of time specified by the State Department of Health and Environmental Control after consultation with the executive committee of the Association of Veterinarians.

(B) A State Department of Health and Environmental Control certificate of pet rabies vaccination will be issued by a licensed graduate veterinarian for each pet, stating the name and address of the owner, the name, breed, color and markings, age, sex of animal and the veterinary or pharmaceutical control number of the vaccination.

(C) Coincident with the issuance of the certificate, the licensed graduate veterinarian shall also furnish a serially numbered metal tag bearing the same number and year as is on the certificate. The metal license tag shall bear the name of the veterinarian and shall at all times be attached to a collar or harness worn by the pet for which the certificate and tag have been issued. Tags must be of the same color and shape when issued in offices of veterinarians.

(D) The owner shall have a valid certificate of rabies vaccination readily available at all times for inspection by the animal services officer or the Public Safety Department designee of health officials.

(E) In the event that a rabies tag is lost, the owner shall obtain a duplicate tag within seven working days.

(F) A certificate of rabies vaccination issued by a licensed veterinarian from another state will be accepted as valid evidence provided it is less than a year from date of issue.

(G) Rabies inoculation must be given by age four months to all cats and dogs.

It shall be unlawful for any person, resident or visitor, to own, keep, harbor or allow a dog within the City limits, or exercise, walk, or allow a dog on public properties without a written permit from the City.

# Proposed Amendments Continued...

## Proposed Amended IOP Sec. 6-2-12.-Rabies Vaccination –

No person shall own, keep or harbor any pet within the city unless the pet has been vaccinated against rabies as provided herein.

(A) Unless the pet has received (as evidenced by certificate) a vaccination from a licensed graduate veterinarian using a vaccine which is good for a period of one year, provided the vaccine has been approved with the longer period of time specified by the State Department of Health and Environmental Control after consultation with the executive committee of the Association of Veterinarians

(B) A State Department of Health and Environmental Control certificate of pet rabies vaccination will be issued by a licensed graduate veterinarian for each pet, stating the name and address of the owner, the name, breed, color and markings, age, sex of animal and the veterinary or pharmaceutical control number of the vaccination.

(C) Coincident with the issuance of the certificate, the licensed graduate veterinarian shall also furnish a serially numbered metal tag bearing the same number and year as is on the certificate. The metal license tag shall bear the name of the veterinarian and shall at all times be attached to a collar or harness worn by the pet for which the certificate and tag have been issued. Tags must be of the same color and shape when issued in offices of veterinarians.

(D) The owner shall have a valid certificate of rabies vaccination readily available at all times for inspection by the animal services officer or the Public Safety Department designee of health officials.

(E) In the event that a rabies tag is lost, the owner shall obtain a duplicate tag within seven working days.

(F) A certificate of rabies vaccination issued by a licensed veterinarian from another state will be accepted as valid evidence provided it is less than a year from date of issue.

(G) Rabies inoculation must be given by age four months to all cats and dogs.

## Proposed Amendments Continued...

### Proposed amended IOP Sec. 6-2-13. - Badges; records.

(A) An animal services officer shall annually provide a sufficient number of metal tags, suitable for animals to be fastened to the animal's collar. This tag shall be delivered to the person holding, keeping or harboring the animal, upon payment of \$25.00 for residents and \$35.00 for non-residents. The name and address of the person to whom the tag has been issued shall be kept on file in the Police Department for the purpose of identification in case the tag should be at any time lost, stolen or otherwise misappropriated. It is further provided that this section shall not apply to persons living in the city temporarily for a period of less than 30 days; however, the person is not relieved of the responsibility under the other sections of this chapter.

(B) Before issuance the metal tag, the owner of the dog shall be required to submit a copy of the certificate of rabies vaccination. Each badge shall be valid for the calendar year commencing January 1 of each year, and no longer.

(C) If the license tag is lost, a new tag may be issued for a fee as established from time to time by the City Council.

(D) With submittal of an American Kennel Club Canine Good Citizenship Certificate at the time of application, applicant shall receive a \$2.00 discount off the applicable annual fee for each certified dog.

# Discussion

- Determine if we want to only require dog owners that will be staying on the island more than 30 days to purchase the collar/badge.
- Determine if we want to go in the same direction as Sullivan's Island and require every dog owner to get a collar/badge if they are on the Isle of Palms for any length of time.
- The proposed amendment, 6-2-12, requiring the rabies vaccination will allow Animal Control Officers to take enforcement action if a dog owner does not have their dog inoculated.
- Add on to the current BS&A software the module for dog licensing which will allow the scanning of the inoculation documents so they can be kept on file. This was not budgeted for FY19, but the cost to add this module, implementation, training and BS&A personnel travel expenses will be \$5,380.

# Tags vs Collars

## Tags

- Currently used by IOPPD Animal Control
- Current fee is \$5 with proof of inoculation
- Metal badges are valid for the calendar year it is issued and no longer
- Fee Increase to be determined

## Collars

- Recommend collar that can be cut to fit – Campbell Pet Company has item – cost for 2600 = \$3926.89
- Recommend metal slide on tag for IOP badge/permit – 2500 = \$500.00
- Both the collar and the metal badge will be valid for the calendar year it is issued and no longer
- Sullivan’s Island uses these products successfully
- Will require a fee increase to cover cost of collars/badges

ARTICLE B. - DOGS<sup>[3]</sup>

## Sec. 6-2-11. - Permit required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep or harbor a dog within the City without a written permit from the City.

## Sec. 6-2-12. - Certificate of vaccination required prior to permit issuance; term.

Before issuing the permit required by this article, the City shall require the applicant to show proof of a current, valid rabies inoculation signed by a licensed veterinarian. Each permit shall be good for one (1) year from the date of its issue, and no longer.

(Code 1994, § 6-2-12; Ord. No. 1994-4, 4-26-1994; Ord. No. 2004-4, § 2, 5-25-2004)

## Sec. 6-2-13. - Badges; records.

The City shall annually provide a sufficient number of metal badges suitable for dogs to be fastened to the animal's collar, numbered from one upwards, stamped "dog permit" and the year of issue. This badge and the written permit shall be delivered to the person owning, keeping or harboring the dog. The name and address of each party to whom such permit and badge has been issued shall be kept on file by the City, for the purpose of identification in case such badges should at any time be lost, stolen or otherwise misappropriated.

## Sec. 6-2-14. - Removal of badge from dog prohibited.

No person shall wrongfully remove a badge from a dog registered as required by this article.

## Sec. 6-2-15. - Running at large prohibited; exceptions.

- (a) No person owning, having an interest in, harboring or having charge, care, control, custody or possession of any dog shall cause or permit the dog to be off the premises of its owner or custodian, unless such dog is securely confined by a strong leash, securely and continuously held by a competent person owning, having an interest in, harboring, or having charge, care, control, custody or possession of the dog, or unless the dog is confined within a vehicle, within an enclosure surrounded by an adequate fence or within a house. Provided, however, that a dog owner or other person charged with the custody and control of a dog may allow the dog to roam at large on the beach between the hours of 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 a.m. from September 15 through March 31, and between the hours of 5:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. from April 1 through September 14. Such owner or custodian shall at all times be in close proximity to the dog, have a leash in hand, and have the dog under control. Nothing contained herein shall affect a dog owner or custodian's duty to comply with all state laws regarding vicious or dangerous dogs, or the duty to comply with section 62-26 requiring the removal of animal excrement.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to cause, permit, accompany or be responsible for the presence of any diseased dog on the streets or public places of the City or allow the dog to run on the premises of another, at

any time; unless and in addition to the other requirements of this chapter the dog shall be securely muzzled to effectively prevent it from biting any person or other animal.

Sec. 6-2-22. - Violation, impoundment, penalties.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to fail to comply with the requirements of this article or to suffer or permit a dog to be a danger to the health, safety, or welfare of the public in violation of this article.
- (b) Any dog running at large in violation of this article shall be impounded. The owner of a licensed dog shall be given notice that the dog may be claimed from the City kennel within three (3) days. A dog with no license or identification will be held in the City kennel for two (2) days. An owner claiming a dog must comply with all requirements of this article and pay to the City an impoundment fee as established by City Council. Dogs not claimed within the applicable holding periods will be transferred to the County SPCA for disposal.
- (c) Violation of this article is a misdemeanor punishable pursuant to section 1-3-66.

Sec. 6-2-23. - Dogs not to disturb protected species and habitats.

In addition to the requirements of section 6-2-15(a), no person shall allow a dog to disturb protected species and habitats, as follows:

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow a dog to disturb nesting sea turtles, turtle nests or turtle hatchlings.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow a dog to enter into critical habitat areas which have been posted to prohibit such entry by the City or the State Wildlife and Marine Resources Department.

I am requesting that City Council authorize a contract in the amount of \$25,585.69 to L3 Mobile Vision, Inc. for the purchase of five (5) Flashback HD In-Car Camera Systems with rear seat camera kit and radar interface for patrol vehicles. I am requesting that L3 Mobile Vision, Inc. be designated as a sole source provider, in compliance with the City's Purchasing Procedures, Section 1-10-3, which allows for a contract to be awarded without competitive bidding when the Purchasing Agent (i.e., the City Administrator) reasonably determines that there is only one qualified source for the required goods or services.

L3 Mobile Vision, Inc. is the only supplier able to meet the needs of the Police Department. The Police Department currently utilizes a server and software from L3 Mobile Vision, Inc. for our body-worn camera and in-car camera solution. By continuing to purchase the Flashback HD In-Car Camera Systems from L3 Mobile Vision, Inc. we ensure the integrity and technology will remain the same and therefore, facilitate its administration, monitoring, maintenance and production of DVDs as required for legal discoveries and FOIA requests. According to the provisions of the Code, this statement must be submitted to City Council and entered in the minutes of the Council.

I recommend that City Council approve the use of L3 Mobile Vision, Inc. as one qualified source for the purchase of five (5) Flashback HD In-Car Camera Systems for Police Department patrol vehicles.

## Isle of Palms Fire Department

### Call Summary

July 2018

- 7/2/18 Fire crews received a call for a structure fire on 28<sup>th</sup> Avenue. It was found that a small fire had occurred within a wall where the gas utility line was entering the structure from the outside tank. Using a thermal imaging camera, crews were able to identify an area within the concrete block wall where temperatures had been elevated. The block wall was breached and water was sprayed into the holes in order to cool the area. No active burning or further fire extensions were found. The gas tank was secured closed and the property manager was advised not to restore gas back to the home until the system could be inspected and properly repaired. All personnel cleared from the scene and returned back to service.
- 7/3/18 Fire crews responded to a report of a structure fire / smell of smoke at the Refuge on Palm Boulevard. Upon arrival, crews found a strong smell of over-heated electrical equipment. When asked, the occupants stated that there had been repairs made to their HVAC units. Fire Department personnel were able to isolate the issue to one of the air handlers in the attic space over the restrooms. Power was secured to the unit and the manager was advised to leave it off until the proper repairs could be made. All personnel cleared from the scene and returned back to service.
- 7/4/18 Fire crews responded to a call of a building collapse on 29<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Upon arrival, personnel were met by the homeowner who stated that while sleeping part of the ceiling collapsed down over them. The damage was caused by a faulty drain switch in the HVAC air handler located in the attic space. Water had overflowed and weakened the sheet rock which led to it falling from the beams. Fire department crews offered to assist the homeowner with the clean-up of the debris, but the homeowner declined. All personnel cleared from the scene and returned back to service.
- 7/4/18 Fire crews responded to a surf rescue in the surf out from Breach Inlet. The caller stated that they could hear the swimmer yelling for help. Fire Department personnel launched jet-skis from the beach and were able to recover the swimmer and return them to safety on the beach. The patient was turned over to law enforcement and Charleston County EMS as he was underage. All personnel cleared from the call and returned back to service.
- 7/5/18 Fire crews responded to an outside fire located on one of the docks on Goat Island. A small fire was found at the end of a dock and was extinguished using a water extinguisher. One of the by-standers stated that the fire was a result of fireworks. All crews cleared from the scene and returned back to service.

- 7/14/18 Fire crews responded to a water rescue located in the Intracoastal Waterway behind #20 Waterway Island Drive. The information being provided was that a person had been ejected from the boat and then ran over by the boat. It was also stated that the patient had been struck by the boats propeller. Due to the mechanism of injury, a helicopter was requested for patient transfer. When Charleston County EMS personnel were able to assess the patient, it was stated that the helicopter would not be needed. The Dewees Island Ferry dock was secured for bringing the patient to shore. The patient's family members were also brought ashore by one of the Charleston County Sheriff's Office boats. The Charleston County Coroner and a Chaplain were called to respond to the patient's location. All fire crews cleared from the scene and returned back to service.






### Calls per Day for July 2018



The following is a synopsis of some of the activities of the Isle of Palms Police Department during the month of July.

## Monday, July 2

### Narcotics Violation – IOP Connector

An officer stopped a vehicle for speeding, 100MPH in a posted 55MPH speed zone. The officer immediately had the driver exit the vehicle, placing him in handcuffs, when a bulge was noticed in the driver's pants. A search of the driver located a semi-automatic handgun in his waistband. A search of the vehicle located an open container of beer that the driver had been holding and a bag of cocaine was in the center console. The driver was charged with speeding, minor in possession of beer, open container, unlawful carrying of firearm and possession of cocaine. It was also determined that the driver was on supervised probation status. The driver was transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

## Wednesday, July 4

### False Pretense/Swindle/Confidence Game – 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue

A victim reported that she contacted a subject who had listed a home for rent on IOP via Craigslist. The victim paid the subject \$1,750 for the rental. Upon arriving at the address, the victim found that the home was already rented. This case has been assigned to CID for further investigation.

### Simple Assault – Yacht Harbor Court

An officer responded to a report of an assault in progress. While attempting to locate the subjects, the officer began talking to a group of people when one subject came up and pointed at a female subject, stating she hit me. The officer located the female subject and attempted to get her away from the group and sit down to continue the investigation. The female subject became hostile and as the officer attempted to detain her, the subject elbowed and then began punching the officer in the face. As the officer attempted to take the subject to the ground, the subject's mother interfered, causing the officer to fall. The subject then began kicking the officer in the head and arm. A second officer arrived on scene and was able to get the subject in handcuffs after using the Taser to gain control. The subject was arrested and charged with disorderly conduct and assault on police officer and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

**Disorderly Conduct – Morgan Cove Drive / Yacht Harbor Court**

While officers were investigating the incident where the officer was assaulted, a male and female subject, who were intoxicated, came up into the area where an officer was interviewing a subject. The officer instructed the subject to step away from the scene, but he replied “yeah, that’s not happening”. The subject was advised a second time to step away, but continued to refuse. The male subject was placed under arrest. While the officer was dealing with the male subject, the intoxicated female attempted to put her arms around the officer to keep him from arresting the male, she was placed under arrest. Both subjects were charged with disorderly conduct, hindering and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

**Thursday, July 5**

**Domestic Violence – 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue**

Officers met with the male and female subjects involved in the domestic situation. It was determined that the male subject struck the female in the eye causing a large swollen bump over her eye while they were arguing. It was also determined that the male subject broke a door while forcing entry into a room where the female was seeking refuge. The male subject was placed arrest for domestic violence and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

**Saturday, July 7**

**Narcotics Violations – Palm Boulevard / 21<sup>st</sup> Avenue**

An officer on patrol observed a vehicle traveling in front of the patrol vehicle with an odor of marijuana emitting from it. The officer conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle. Contact with the driver determined that he had been smoking marijuana in the vehicle just before being stopped. A search of the vehicle located a baggie of marijuana in the center console and a search of a duffle bag on the rear passenger seat revealed another baggie with marijuana, individually wrapped baggies of cocaine, and a digital scale. The driver was arrested and charged with possession with intent to distribute cocaine – 3<sup>rd</sup> offense, possession with intent to distribute marijuana – 3<sup>rd</sup> offense and driving under suspension – 3<sup>rd</sup> offense. The subject was transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

**Sunday, July 8**

**Credit Card Fraud – 9000 Block Palmetto Drive**

An officer responded to a report of fraudulent use of credit card for a subject paying for a rental property. The victim reported that an unauthorized charge of \$1,420 was made to her credit card. The officer knocked on the door of the rental property and made contact with the suspect. The suspect was determined to have multiple unpaid traffic citations and was placed under arrest. He was transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center where a hold was placed on him until warrants for the credit card fraud could be served. This case is continuing and has been assigned to CID for further investigation.

**Tuesday, July 10**

**Domestic Violence – Chapman Avenue**

A victim reported that on the previous night her husband choked her until she could not breathe. She indicated that they had been out for dinner and her husband became intoxicated so they went home. The next morning the victim went to the hospital for treatment and we were notified by the hospital of

the incident. A warrant was obtained and the husband was arrested and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center. Investigation of this case continues and it has been assigned to CID.

### Wednesday, July 11

#### Credit Card Fraud – 200 Block Grand Pavilion Boulevard

During an investigation of a similar incident that took place on July 8, an Investigator determined that the same suspect had used another victim's credit card to pay for a rental property. The amount charged was \$2,054.46. CID obtained warrants for the subject and arrested him July 12 for financial card theft and financial transaction card fraud. The subject was lodged in the Al Cannon Detention Center.

### Saturday, July 14

#### Simple Possession of Marijuana – 14<sup>th</sup> Avenue / Ocean Boulevard

An officer observed a moped driving recklessly on Ocean Boulevard and attempted to stop the driver and occupant. The driver attempted to evade the officer by going behind the shops at Ocean Park Plaza and then down the beach access path at 14<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Officers were able to apprehend the subjects on the beach and during a search incident to arrest located marijuana in one of the subject's socks. It was determined that both subjects were under the age of 17, making them juveniles. The subjects were charged with unlawful possession of tobacco, hindering, simple possession of marijuana, reckless driving, and resisting arrest. Due to them being juveniles, they were released to their parents.

#### Narcotics Violation – IOP Connector

An officer stopped a vehicle for speeding, 68MPH in a posted 55MPH speed zone. Contact with the driver determined that his driver's license was currently suspended. Further investigation found the driver to be in unlawful possession of oxycodone hydrochloride tablets and was placed under arrest. The driver was charged with driving under suspension 3<sup>rd</sup> offense, failure to pay traffic tickets – 3 counts, and possession of controlled substance, and was transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

### Sunday, July 15

#### Driving Under the Influence – IOP Connector

Officers got out with a vehicle that had stopped at the merge lane onto the IOP Connector and was causing a traffic hazard. The investigation revealed that there was an odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from the vehicle and driver. The officer requested that the driver complete Standardized Field Sobriety Tests and at the end of testing, was placed under arrest. The driver was transported to the IOPPSB for Datamaster testing, where she refused to provide a breath sample. The driver was transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

#### False Pretense/Swindle/Confidence Game – 100 Block Grand Pavilion Boulevard

A victim reported that he had rented a vacation rental from Craigslist and paid a deposit of \$1,340.04 through PayPal. When the victim went to check in, he realized that he had been scammed. This case has been assigned to CID for further investigation.

#### Vandalism – 43<sup>rd</sup> Avenue

An officer placed an immobilization boot on a vehicle due to outstanding parking citations. When the officer returned to remove the boot, he found where the violator had attempted to drive with the boot

attached to his vehicle. The immobilization boot was damaged and no longer able to be used. The violator was issued a citation for damage to real property with a court date in the Isle of Palms Municipal Court.

#### Driving Under the Influence – Breach Inlet

An officer stopped a vehicle for multiple moving violations. Contact with the driver determined that there was an odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from within the vehicle and the driver. When asked, the driver admitted to drinking vodka and soda earlier. The officer requested the driver complete Standardized Field Sobriety Tests and at the end of the testing, was placed under arrest. The driver was transported to the IOPPSB for Datamaster testing and provided a breath sample registering a .14% BAC.

#### Monday, July 16

##### Domestic Violence – 34<sup>th</sup> Avenue Beach Access

Officers responded to a report of a domestic violence in progress on the beach. On arrival, they met with the female half of the incident and determined that she and the male subject had been arguing and he took her cell phone and ripped the keys from her hand causing cuts to her hand and fingers. Based on information obtained and that the male subject had taken the female subject's cell phone, which prevented her from calling for help, the male subject was arrested for domestic violence 2<sup>nd</sup> degree and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

##### Driving Under the Influence – 41<sup>st</sup> Avenue / Waterway Boulevard

An officer responded to a report of a possibly intoxicated driver. The officer located the vehicle and conducted a traffic stop. Contact with the driver determined that she was possibly under the influence. When asked if she had been drinking, the driver stated she had one glass of wine. The officer requested the driver complete Standardized Field Sobriety Testing and at the end of the testing, was placed under arrest. The driver was transported to the IOPPSB for Datamaster testing and provided a breath sample registering a .17% BAC.

#### Wednesday, July 18

##### Noise Ordinance Violation / Hindering -3300 Block Cameron Boulevard

Officers responded to a report of a noise complaint with people being loud and music playing. Contact was made with the subject responsible for renting the residence and explained that at 1am they were causing a disturbance and issued him a citation for noise violation in the Isle of Palms Municipal Court. The subject continued to refuse to follow officer instructions and continued yelling. The subject was arrested for hindering and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

A victim reported that she noticed unauthorized charges made to her credit card. It was determined that approximately \$13,432.41 had been fraudulently charged. This case has been assigned to CID for further investigation.

### Disorderly Conduct – 1500 Block Palm Boulevard

An officer on night shift responded to a report of a subject sleeping on a bench in front of a local business. The subject was determined to be grossly intoxicated and difficult to understand. The subject was unable to provide any information and unable to care for himself. The subject was arrested and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

## Friday, July 27

### Domestic Violence – 7000 Block Palmetto Drive

Officers responded to a report of a woman screaming for help. When officers arrived, they separated the male and female subjects. The female explained that they had been drinking today and then began to argue and her husband pushed her down the stairs and the officer observed signs of injury, but the female refused medical treatment. The male subject indicated that his wife had kicked, hit and bitten him, but he was trying to avoid a confrontation with her. An officer also spoke with the juvenile who was present but did not see any physical fighting only heard them arguing, which she said happens often. Due to both parties being intoxicated and mutual combatants, they were both arrested for domestic violence 3<sup>rd</sup> degree and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center. The juvenile was able to stay with a relative that lived nearby.

## Saturday, July 28

### Stolen Property Offenses – IOP Connector

An officer observed a vehicle with an equipment violation and when he turned around to stop the vehicle, it turned down 20<sup>th</sup> Avenue where the driver jumped out with the vehicle still moving and took off running. The driver's description was put out over the radio and the officer chased after the driver but lost him when he jumped a six-foot privacy fence. During the investigation, when an officer contacted the vehicle's owner, it was learned that it had been stolen and the victim was contacting the Charleston County Sheriff's Office to file a report. Another officer patrolling the area observed a subject matching the description of the driver at the Circle K. When the officer contacted the subject, he provided his name and date of birth and then took off running again towards Oak Harbor Boulevard. The subject jumped a fence and then disappeared into the trees along Hamlin Creek. Attempts to get a mutual-aid response for a K-9 unit were unsuccessful. Officers were able to positively identify the subject from this South Carolina driver's license photograph and secured warrants for violation of non-residence violators compact (NRVC) – 2 counts, failure to stop for blue lights, leaving scene of accident with property damage, possession of a stolen motor vehicle, and driving under suspension – 3<sup>rd</sup> offense.

### Theft from Motor Vehicle – 22<sup>nd</sup> Avenue

A victim reported that an unknown person(s) entered his locked vehicle and stole his handgun. The victim noticed that when he opened his vehicle that papers and miscellaneous items from his glove box and center console were out of order and thrown around. The victim was able to provide a serial number for the handgun and it was entered into NCIC. The approximate value of the stolen item is \$375. This case has been assigned to CID for further investigation.

### Domestic Violence – 4000 Block Hartnett Boulevard

Officers responded to a report of a physical disturbance. The caller was indicating that an intoxicated male subject was trying to attack her and her son. When officers arrived, they saw a male subject

standing in the street and detained him until they could determine his relationship to the event. Officers then made contact with the female caller who indicated that the male subject that had been detained was her husband and he was the one attacking them. It was determined that the male subject had shoved his wife into the glass door, had thrown the son down to the floor, and continued to be aggressive toward them. The wife also indicated that her husband possessed a rifle that was in the upstairs bedroom. A criminal history check found that the husband was denied from being able to possess a firearm. The male subject was arrested, charged with domestic violence – 2<sup>nd</sup> degree, unlawful possession of a firearm and transported to the Al Cannon Detention Center.

#### **Community Service Activities / Notable Mentions**

During the month of July 2018, Officers issued one hundred twenty (120) "Property Security Check Notices" and seventeen (17) "You Could Have Been a Victim of a Crime" notices.

July 2 – Detective Louise Hardy assisted with the summer camp at the IOP Recreation Center for Hero Week. She discussed summer safety and handed out safety-themed coloring books.

July 5 – Detective Louise Hardy and Pfc. Thomas Molino organized the IOP Beach Clean Up, coordinating with Charleston County Parks and Recreation and Palmetto Pride to clean the beach after the July 4<sup>th</sup> Fireworks Event. Approximately 30 volunteers helped to clean up the area, collecting over fifteen large bags of trash. Public Works was also on hand to empty the cans and pick up large debris from the area.

July 7 – FTO Dylan Reynolds met with resident from Mount Pleasant to assist with the inspection, installation and education of a child safety seat.

July 10 – FTO James Couche met with a resident from Gastonia, South Carolina to assist with the inspection, installation and education of a child safety seat.

July 17 – FTO James Taylor met with an island resident to assist with the inspection, installation and education of a child safety seat.

July 24 – Detective Louise Hardy and PFC Thomas Molino went to the beach area in the Front Beach business district for a Pops with Cops community relations event where they gave out freeze pops to children on the beach. They spoke with over one hundred visitors and residents and handed out 75 freeze pops.

July 25 – FTO Dylan Reynolds met with a resident from Mount Pleasant to assist with the inspection, installation and education of a child safety seat.
